THE PASTOR'S PLACE . . .

TURNING POINT 230: WORKING TO REALIZE GOD'S GOOD PURPOSE

'For it is God who works in you to will and to act according to his good purpose.' *Philippians 2:13*

This year FCCW turns 230! At this time in our church's history we find ourselves at a cultural turning point, and we are not alone as a church in facing the challenges posed. Mainline churches like ours all over the country are experiencing a decrease in the numbers of people participating in church life, and there are many reasons for this. Families are busier than ever, with both members of household couples working. Sports and extracurricular activities are now routinely held on Sunday mornings. Often, Sunday is the only day of the week on which busy households have relatively fewer commitments, and so folks will opt to stay home out of sheer exhaustion. We live in one of the two states in the country with the lowest rate of participation in church life; the other is Vermont. "Unchurched" folks will often say, "Well, I can be a good person without going to church." True enough. Or they might say, "My worship time is spent outdoors, experiencing nature." That's good, too. However . . .

Folks who have not yet experienced a church like ours do not know what they are missing! There is nothing like a loving, warm, involved, caring servant-church and the community of support that exists within it— what a wonderful expression of the grace and love of God!

Research is demonstrating that mainline churches like ours CAN and DO thrive, but that to do so in this cultural environment, we are going to have to be the church in some very **new ways**. We are going to (and have begun to) offer our presence as a church in digital space, using social media in ways we never have. We are going to expand our presence as church in the community, as evidenced by programs such as "Pub Grub and Soul Food" (just a beginning!).

To accomplish this, we will need to strengthen our giving to our beloved church, with joy and hope in this "turning point" year. Shrinking our capacity will not allow us to explore the new ways of being church that research has shown so strongly are necessary, if churches are to thrive.

Of course, we all know that we cannot expect change by doing the same thing over and over again. We find ourselves in the throes of brainstorming, teaching and learning, and a new period of action. A time is *now* that we can make a difference, through ongoing dialogs with Rev. Mary, Leadership Council, Team Synergy, Christian Education, and one-to-one conversations, about new directions we are poised to move forward. And once we get going— watch out!

This year some of the efforts and goals of the Stewardship Ministry will include the following, and will be carried out in conjunction with other Ministries within our body. Some of these are ongoing, and others are being discussed by multiple Ministries and therefore a credit to many, but all worthy of pursuing or exploring:

- Pursuing new, fun, exciting, successful fundraising ideas & events
- Exploring options for online donations and pledge payments



PARISH HELPERS FIELD TRIP

The Parish Helpers October 8th gathering will be a Field Trip to see a special exhibit, "The World War II Art of Private Charles J. Miller," at the Wright Museum. The exhibit displays the seldom-seen sketches by self-taught artist Charles Miller. These works provide an unfiltered look at the everyday life of G.I.s who fought in the Pacific Theater during World War II. Because Miller also wrote descriptions of what he portrayed on most of his sketches, his works are historical documents as well as art. The eighty-three sketches in the exhibit represent a fraction of the 700 works Miller created during his time in the Pacific. TREASURER'S REPORT

Operating Budget (Non-restricted): June 1, 2015 – Aug 31, 2015

Income:	\$ 27,701.69
Expenditures:	\$ (25,915.12)
Net Income (Loss)	<u>\$ 1,786.57</u>

Checking Non-Restricted Funds balance as of August 31, 2015: \$7,104.82

Restricted Funds balance as of August 31, 2015: \$2,643.37

What do the above numbers really mean? It seems fairly straight forward. So far this year, the income number represents Sunday collections (including pledges paid to date), fund raising, and building use. Expenses are made up of salaries and employee benefits, as well as our OCWM contribution, utilities, some repairs to the elevator and phone system, and our annual required Association dues.

As of August 31, we are a little ahead for the year. In large part, this is due to the record breaking Yard Sale on August 29th that generated a whopping \$4,059 for the fund raising line in the budget. Kudos go to Dalton Ostrye and her able team who worked extremely hard to bring off this successful endeavor.

A new addition this month is the checking non-restricted fund line, which gives the actual amount available to pay for budget items as of the given date in our general checking account. We wish we had included this information all along, but just did not think of it. Thanks to Rich Zacher for the suggestion. As you can see, we had a positive budgetary cash flow of over \$7,000 as we entered September. Always a good thing!

It may seem simple, but in reality there is a great deal behind these few numbers. Please check out the treasurer's complete monthly report which is posted in the narthex each month. Or even better, let us know you are interested and we will add you to our monthly email distribution list.

MEET THE VANDERHOOPS



Sixty-one years ago Donna and Parker were married in Concord, Massachusetts as Donna was graduating from Nursing School and Parker was rejoining his family's 50-year-old hardware store after returning from serving in the desert climate of Morocco as a member of the US Air Force. They both attended Concord High School where Parker was a social butterfly with a busy dating schedule while Donna observed from the "sidelines", not wanting to be one of his "dates"! They met during social activities with the Demolay/Rainbow Masonic clubs. Parker was 2 years older and went to Bryant and Stratton Business School after graduation before joining Air Force and serving in a Morocco Air Base that housed strategic bombers during those tense Cold War days with the USSR.

Their romance kindled after high school when Donna went to Green Mountain Junior College in Vermont and then to nursing school at Children's Hospital in Boston. They dated while Parker came home on leave, were engaged in 1953, and were married on June 26, 1954 at Concord Trinity Episcopal Church, where Parker was baptized, and the SAME date Donna's parents and grandparents were married!

Donna's nursing career continued as their family expanded to 6 with Bob (1955), Scott (1956), Sharon (1960) and Jay (1961). Donna worked at Emerson Hospital as a nurse while raising the kids by changing her work shifts to coincide with mothering at home while Parker helped run the family's hardware store with his dad.

Today their family extends to 10 grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren, soon to be 7 in October with Sharon's daughter and husband expecting their first born! Later Donna left nursing to take over the hardware

office duties when they needed her there. When son Bob shared the reins of the hardware store with Parker, Parker took up lock-smithing at the store and retired in 1995 when Scott took over its management. They moved into "Westlook" in Wakefield Corner and share time between Westlook and their Great East Lake house during the summers.

The family has always been very close especially this past year when both Donna and Parker battled major health issues amidst daily prayers from their kids and church family. Despite these challenges they both continue on - so much in love and always smiles to share each and every day.

Both Donna and Parker are major Revolutionary War history buffs especially with Parker's 3rd great grandfather - gunsmith, farmer and Army Captain Isaac Davis who commanded the minutemen who stood on the bridge in Concord across from the British Army where the "shot heard round the world" was fired and the war began. Captain Davis was a true hero who was one of the first to fall at the Battle of Concord Bridge as the war for independence was launched. What a proud heritage for the family!

The two lovebirds continue their daily tradition of playing 3 games of cribbage, complete with score sheet showing games won and lost year after year and sharing their proud tradition of love of each other and their proud extended family.
