Beloveds of FCCW:

On February 9, 2020 you made a historical decision, to call a pastor who will be available to you less than full-time. You reviewed the information that was prepared and came ready to discuss and share your fears and hopes. The atmosphere in the sanctuary was calm. It was apparent people arrived with a prayerful spirit.

Consensus does not mean everybody agrees; it means everybody agrees to abide by the majority vote. FCCW you demonstrated consensus.

There are studies available demonstrating how small churches became more vibrant after calling a less-than full-time pastor. One I recently read was conducted in 2017 by Bangor Theological Seminary. After visiting nearly two dozen mainline congregations who have switched from full-time clergy to one of the forms of part-time clergy coverage, three models emerged illustrating how vital churches made the adjustment. One mindset change for a vital church was to view the pastor as **an equipper of laypeople**, one who focuses on the gifts that are in the Body of Christ and gives them permission to rise up and serve in new and creative ways.

One laity led outreach experiment was called "Messy Grace." Monthly at 5pm on Saturday afternoons, families with young kids who don't otherwise go to church, stop by for a 10-minute taste of worship, followed by music, supper and an environmental lesson, such as gardening or composting.

These small vital churches made it a priority for the pastor to be **an ambassador** for the church through strategic use of their time. This meant the pastor did less visiting and less attendance at meetings and more leading and engagement externally in the local community.

Being seen as **a team member**, sharing the pastoral duties was also a major change in these vital churches understanding of pastoral relations. It was important for the pastor to train, equip and release all members to live out their call to ministry.

FCCW you are an empowered willing and able laity! The Christian Century reviewed the book by Robert LaRochelle and LaRochelle states," the mainstream church of the future" needs congregations that are "small, progressive, and alive."

My Beloveds be strong and bold; look to Christ for strength and remember God promised a future with hope. Pastor Alberta

Thank you so much for collecting for the May 9th shipping container. Seeing children without shoes or proper clothing is painful. (They need everything but especially underwear, kids NEED underwear!) If you can hold on to your donations until Ann and I get back to NH, we will get some teams together to help us box them up. Please check the earlier wish list posted on the church website. Also, any extra or an unused wheelbarrows would be like gold here and would be used for carrying buckets of water and agricultural tasks.

Because of the continuing lack of stability, the inflation rate is hovering around 500%. The government isn't actually publishing the inflation rate, and sadly, they continue to print money. Last week I could change \$1 US dollar for \$22 Zim bond notes; the week before it was \$18-19 Zim notes. People are cutting corners with food. Most are eating one meal a day, some go every other day. One teacher told me she can no longer buy cooking oil, or the staple tomatoes for "the soup" which goes with sadza, and certainly no meat. (Beef was about \$65 per kg when I left in November and is now way over \$100. Eggs were \$50 per crate and now about \$105.00.) The teacher said they eat sadza alone and sometimes mix salt with water to dip it in. One friend told me her neighbor asked for a cup of mealie meal so she could make some porridge for her kids. I get so frustrated that the government can't seem to get the food right. Since I have US dollars I am well ahead and it enables PKZ to stretch your giving dollars.

I am excited to report five are booked for our July Zim travel team! Jillian Currier, Ann Bilodeau, and Royal Doughty will be joined by Jody Dewolf Whiting of Lancaster, NH and Pam Jennette of Wrentham, MA. What an adventure awaits! Work camps at Rufumiso, Mt Selinda, Madhuku Village ECD, and Humani will be interspersed with visits to the beautiful yet hard hit cyclone area of Chimanimani, banana plantations, schools, clinics, tea estates, game drives, national parks at The Great Zimbabwe, Matapos, and Hwange, culminating at the magnificent Victoria Falls.

Your Pastoral Search Team understands you are trusting them to remain prayerful as they listen for the person God is calling to be your next settled pastor. Please remember to remain prayerful with them as they prepare their hearts and minds to begin interview conversations with clergy candidates. They will continue to meet with me in March focusing on getting comfortable with Zoom meetings and interviewing.

Your Profile Committee is at full steam towards having the draft Church Profile reviewed by the readers and the Search and Call Committee. After which, the document will be presented to all FCCW members before being sent to the New Hampshire Conference for approval. April 22nd has been reserved for Rev. Richard Slater to return to meet with your Search and Call and Profile Committee members.

The Search and Call Committee has organized, dividing up the committee tasks as follows:

Chairperson – Ryan McCarthy, will serve as the primary liaison with the Conference/Association staff person; facilitate all meetings of the committee; oversee and organize the work flow; move the process along in a timely fashion; encourage discussion of various viewpoints; make certain that each member has an equal voice; ensure that decisions reached are the consensus of the group; ensure that the committee follows non-discrimination guidelines; remind members of their confidentiality pledge; make certain that hospitality arrangements are in place; report regularly to the congregation.

Secretarial/scribes/tracker – Linda Messer, Julie Evenson, Chuck Hodson, will share in corresponding with all candidates in a timely fashion; Chuck will maintain a careful "tracking" system on the status of candidates. Linda Messer will facilitate the circulation of ministerial profiles among the members; Linda and Julie will share in recording the major decisions of the committee for committee review only (those notes will be shredded once the Committee's work is completed).

Chaplain – George Ackerman and Linda Messer will incorporate regular times of prayer, meditation and scripture readings during the Committee's meeting times and encourage the congregation to hold the committee in prayer.

The By-Laws dictate there must be at least eight (8) deacons, but there is no limit established.

Deacons: Gifts and Tasks to serve at FCCW

Ministry of the Diaconate as stated in FCCW's Constitution and Bylaws:

Deacons shall:

Share with the Pastor in the oversight of the spiritual life of the Church;

Assist in the administration of the Sacraments of the Lord's Supper (Communion) and Baptism;

Consult with the Pastor and together with the Pastor, advise the Membership on matters of faith and morals when such become subjects at issue in the Church;

Conduct a program of evangelism, reaching out to welcome and to invite new members into the Church;

Participate in the nurture, care, and discipline of Members, and in a ministry of visitation.

Consult with Calling & Discernment and Personnel in the calling forth of a Pastoral Search Team whenever a Pastoral vacancy occurs;

Recommend to the Ministry of Personnel a compensation package for the Pastor;

At its discretion, recommend to the Leadership Council the honorary appointment of a "Pastor Emeritus" to recognize a Pastor retired from the First Congregational Church Wakefield, UCC.

This ministry is best delivered by both women and men to reflect the whole Body of Christ.

Service Gifts
