It's Thursday. The sun is shining bright upon the remnants of the snow from the most recent snowstorm. I was really bemoaning the beautiful white flacks that fell from the sky providing the moisture, I have learned that New Hampshire farmers look forward to before the spring burst forward. I want the spring to burst forward just like we leaped into setting our clocks ahead!

My impatience with the move of the seasons comes along with me having to set up a new workflow. I am a very adaptable person; it comes with the call to transitional ministry, yet I feel as if a giant STOP sign has been placed in my life/ our lives.

This week I started my new workflow schedule. I am now in the office Monday – Thursday with Friday, Saturday and SUNDAY off! (Yes, I do 10- or 12-hour days.) Whoever heard of a pastor taking every Sunday off? What has happened to church? "COVID-19!"

The virtual STOP sign emerged for our safety; stop gathering in groups larger than 10; stop in-person meetings; stop 6 feet behind a person or allow 6 feet in between; stop eating out (a major stop for me); stop and wash your hands after touching any hard surfaces; stop touching your face with your hands; STOP the spread of this novel coronavirus by flattening the curve.

NEWS FLASH!!! New Hampshire Governor just announced an Emergency Stay-at-Home Order!!!

STOP! Again. This is our current season. Be Ready! Stay Alert! Be Calm! Connect! BREATHE IN/ BLOW IT OUT!

God of grace and God of mercy hear our cries! Show us how to be your people during this health pandemic. Shower us with your peace that is beyond all understanding. Knit us tighter together. Let us show the world what Love looks like. Expand our understanding of community and communal worship. Give us the right questions to ask and open our ears and hearts to hear. Come Holy Spirit! Come!! Amen.

How is the Church Being Church!

We will never change the world by going to church. We will only change the world by being the church. At FCCW we are being the Church in these times when churches cannot gather due to the pandemic health crisis. This is how we are continuing to change the world:

+ Your Deacons have been assigned persons to check in on. This is our commitment to making sure all are connected, and all can have a sense of belonging. You know, to say with pride, "that is MY Church!"

+To make sure basic needs can be met, i.e., getting groceries when you cannot get out or should not be out, FCCW has partnered with Lovell Lake Food Center. For those persons, FCCW members and those in our

community, who do not have help from family or friends to pick up groceries and may not have a credit card to pay on-line, our **Expanded Shepherds Program** will provide someone to **pick up groceries** at Lovell Lake, **charge to FCCW account**, **drop off the groceries** and allow the **person to mail in a check** for the cost of the groceries to FCCW.

+ During the Governor's "stay at home" order our Congregational Life Administrator, Julie Margolis is working from home. She has transferred the church phone to her personal cell during working hours (9am to 3pm) and has set up the office equipment (computers) in her home. Your calls, emails and requests are still addressed, and she continues to support the tasks that come from me.

+ All Ministry leaders meet weekly by Zoom to check in and to make sure we have not missed any of the essentials of running the church. Every voice has voice!

+ The Diaconate meet weekly by Zoom to check-in and to let me know how everybody is doing and who may need a pastoral call.

+ Building and Grounds devised a plan for the church to be disinfected. When we can gather again, it will be in a building that has had a deep cleaning of all hard surfaces and of its carpets.

+ To support the Hazel MacBrien Nursery School who rents space at the church, it was agreed to move outside of the contract, which requires a monthly fee usage and only invoice for the space when it is used. "Grace makes space!"

+ As usual, Sunday worship services have many behind the scenes people. The technology that the church already had in placed has been used to connect us on Sunday morning with pre-taped services uploaded to our YouTube page, website and Facebook page. The church now has Zoom Pro, which allows teleconferencing of meetings that last longer than 40 minutes. Beginning Sunday, April 5th we will invite everyone to Zoom Worship. You will be able to connect via your phone with audio only or via your computer with video and audio. We will be able to hear one another and see some. We will no longer pre-tape to comply with the "stay-at-home" order.

+Your financial generosity has not stopped! You have dropped off your pledges and donations or placed them in the U.S. mail. THANK YOU!!

+ The Shepherd's Program continues to provide rides to **critical appointments**, i.e. **outpatient services that are life saving** and the rider has no family or friends who can transport. To keep the rider and driver safe, we are asking the driver to wear a mask and gloves and would like the rider to do the same. Social distancing cannot be achieved in a vehicle and if you are transporting someone who is not in your familiar (family) circle, please wear mask and gloves. FCCW is committed to assist the "least of these" in times of need.

+ You have reached out to call and check in on folks. You have sent me encouraging emails and notes. You are continuing to *be* the love we talk about! You, FCCW are being the Church! Be Calm! Connect! Remember, it is just a season.

Wash your hands, don't touch your face; continue to BE the Church!

HOW DO WE CELEBRATE THE RESURRECTED ONE WHEN WE CAN'T GATHER?!

As your pastor, I've been asking myself that question since we closed the building on March 15th. The building closed, but our hearts did not.

Maybe the question is: how do we show community and express joy for what God has done for us? What will Easter Service look like in this season of COVID-19?

It will look like Hollywood Squares!!!



Yes, we each will be at home and seen on our screens. Some people will have their names attached to the symbol of a phone, as they connect by phone only.

What will you share on your screen in your box to show the joy of the Easter Season?

Well, think on that and be prepared to have a "show and tell" as we gather for Easter Service via Zoom on April 12th. Mine, will be something that sits on top.

News from Zimababwe

I had the opportunity to visit two schools, Singizi and Rutengeni High Schools, to distribute sanitary pads this past week before schools closed. These are government schools located in very rural areas. Both were established in 2015 due to the growing need. At Singizi, teachers taught in small wooden sheds with metal sides and a metal roof until four new classrooms were built this January. Singizi has 300 students and six teachers. Some are still taught outside. Depending on the subject, there are 50-70 kids in one classroom. The government started to erect multiple Blair toilets (hole in the cement floor style) but they couldn't pay the builders so the builders walked off the job. Only four toilets are completed for the 300+ people present each day. Of the six staff, three went on maternity leave in January. (Yikes!) The government did not provide substitute teachers so the school committee enticed two people from Chipinge to teach. The parents put together a little money to pay them but it hardly covers the money for combis to get to or from school. These two teachers consider their time as community service. Some students travel 15-20 km (9 -12+ miles one way) to get to Singizi. One organization donated eight bicycles to be shared by the 20 who have the longest distance. The head teacher said eight kids use the bicycle one week and eight the next. I didn't have the heart to ask about the four who aren't factored into the biweekly arrangement.

At Rutengeni High School we learned that two of the 230 students are physically disabled. One girl has crutches but the male student, who was perfectly fine before contracting TB last year, is in need of a wheel-I have no idea how they physically get to chair. The girls and the teachers were absoluteschool. thrilled to receive sanitary pads--the same with lv Singizi-- yet one very persistent teacher asked, "But how are they to wash them? Did you bring soap?" I was surprised as no school had ever mentioned the need for soap. She went on, "The green bar (a basic laundry soap used in Zimbabwe for dishes, bathing and laundry) is too dear and our students can't afford it." Sadly, that made sense as already high prices on basic goods had risen about 40% just in the past five days.

I also stopped at Rimbi High School to check in on one of our sponsored Form 1 students. Christina Bandama lives in Gumira with her grandmother some 15k away (9.6 miles) and it is too far to walk to school every day so she rents a room for 100 rand (about \$6) each month in order to be closer to the school. (Imagine your 8th grader living on her own, doing all of her own cooking, laundry, and other chores including fetching wood for a fire.) She came running when she saw me saying "MADAME!" and wrapped me in a huge hug. She reported school had been going well and, although she had enough books, having enough pens has been a problem. I wanted to give you a flavor of what life is like for Zim students. My heart breaks just about everyday but I am so grateful for your support that allows PKZ to help as we can. Believe me, Christina will have all the pens she needs when school resumes.

Shepherd Program (rides to medical appointments)

The Shepherd Program is continuing to offer <u>CRITI-CAL rides for people who are NOT ill.</u> In this time of uncertainty, many of our faithful drivers have chosen to step back from driving people to doctor's appointments. We do have a few remaining drivers, and even a new driver, but our concern for their well-being is high. We want both our drivers and riders to be as safe as possible. Therefore, we are now requiring our drivers to wear protective gloves and masks during transport. This program should now be used only for critical rides for people who are not ill. If you are ill or not feeling well, we ask that you call your doctor for advice, and use professional transportation such as an ambulance.

Shepherd Program — (expanded service)

NEW! The Shepherd Program is expanding its ministry to help deliver groceries to those who are shut it. This is a temporary and expanded service utilizing many of our already committed drivers, and new folk are signing up to help as well.

FIRST, Lovell Lake Market will take orders over the phone, charge your credit card, and deliver groceries to your door. If for some reason this doesn't work for you, the Shepherd Program may be able to help.

If you are shut in, please call the church office at 522-3189 and speak with Julie Margolis, our Congregational Life Administrator. She will direct the need to the Shepherd Program who will make a list of the items you need, and then will find a driver to pick up your groceries and deliver them to your door. Inside the bag with your items, you will find a slip with the amount you owe the church. It will be your responsibility to make repayment to the church.

We're all connected to one another. Please don't hesitate to reach out if you need help.

History Article —Congregationalism

Congregationalism, Christian movement arose in England in the late 16th and 17th centuries. It emphasizes the right and responsibility of each properly organized congregation to determine its own affairs, without having to submit these decisions to the judgment of any higher human authority. Each individual church is regarded as independent and autonomous.

Although it was not always true in the early days in America, Congregationalists have generally been distrustful of state establishment of religion and have worked for civil and religious liberty. Their emphasis on the rights of the particular congregation and on freedom of conscience arose from their strong convictions concerning the sovereignty of God and the priesthood of all believers. This attitude has led many of them to adopt theological and social liberalism and to participate in the ecumenical movement. ©2020 Encyclopædia Britannica, Inc.
