Good Deeds and Inspiration

I recently attended the Annual Meeting of the NH Conference, UCC. Our church was allowed 5 delegates as well as many visitors, but I believe only Max and I attended. Too bad, because although it was virtual, it was very well done. At least we had the demographics of youngers to olders achieved.

I was enrolled as a delegate and, therefore, allowed to vote on the proposed resolution, *Who will speak for the Trees? The Rights of Nature* presented by the Federated Church, a Creation and Justice UCC Church in Marlborough. Actually, other than the normal dose of guilt, that resolution is *why* I chose to attend the meeting. And I am very happy to report that it passed by a 99% vote, and that it is now on its way to General Synod for Synod consideration. I will write more about this wonderful resolution later, but, as it turns out, my true inspiration (and what brought me back after the lunch break) was the keynote address offered by the Rev. Michael Caine, currently of Old First UCC in Philadelphia.

Rev. Caine was introduced to us just before the break, and as he greeted us, he asked that we listen to Wynton Marsalis's "I don't have a ghost of a chance with you" over our lunch break. Wynton Marsalis is a jazz musician, composer, teacher and artistic director of Jazz at Lincoln Center. I am attaching the link here so you can listen to the piece before reading further. Michael Caine began his address by recounting an event that occurred at the Village Vanguard in NYC. In 2003, Wynton Marsalis was playing the same ballad, but as a solo performance. This piece can run up to 11 minutes, depending on how it's played and upon how it's interpreted. On this particular evening, a music critic for the Atlantic Magazine was in attendance and reported that the performance had been magical and that the audience was being lifted and carried along toward the end, until someone's cell phone went off. He described it as "magic ruined!" However, after stopping for just a beat, Marsalis continued by playing a repeat of the ring tone as the audience roared with laughter. He played at that for a while before bringing the music back to where he was before the interruption, then finally resolved the piece to a wild audience response.

Michael Caine quoted jazz great duke Ellington saying that "a problem is a chance you get to do your best". Can you see where this is going? Improvisation? We're now being given an opportunity in our current reality of church during Covid to do something different and perhaps great.

I also looked up what Wynton Marsalis has to say about improv. He says, "One thing you learn as a jazz musician is how to listen. We don't know what people are going to play, so it's very important to follow them. If you want to find something new to play, listen to the person next to you."

Caine says we now find ourselves in a new and interesting place as some consider church in the sanctuary as the only possible worship experience, while others see the church of the future only through the lens of on-line offerings. He suggests that perhaps there is a place in between. Because of this pandemic church is changing, but with some improv – listening, thinking creatively and acting freely - we have a chance to do

our best. God is asking more of us at this time, and we have more room right now to try new things.

Caine sited the book, The Jazz of Preaching, by the Rev. Dr. Kirk Byron Jones, particularly Chapter 5, The Freedom of Improvisation. Why play? Because there's always more music to be played and to be heard, than the music you have already played. Why improvise? Because to improvise is to create. Because to improvise is to be in search and to be surprised on purpose. Because musicality is too rich not to. Because the Spirit says so. Because improvisation is a way to be free.

Caine asks, what if this opportunity to improvise is a chance for us to do our best? Because what we do in church matters, and we should be trying to do our best.

Miles Davis wrote about his recording, Kind of Blue. "See, if you put a jazz musician in a place where he has to do something different from what he does all the time, then he can do it, but he's got to think differently in order to do it. The jazz musician has got to play above what he knows, far above it, and what that might lead to might take him above the place where he's been playing all along to the new place where he finds himself then, and to the next place where he's going, and even above that because then anything can happen and that's where great art and music happen."

Caine asks, do we have the audacity and courage t go above what we know, to go to a new place, the next place where anything can happen? Improvisation can be the Spirit taking all of our skills and knowledge and practice and experience and making some more of them all.

This has been just a sample of the wonderful and inspirational keynote address and I hope this has been enough of a tickler to make you want to listen to it in its entirety through the link below. Start at the beginning to enjoy Amazing Grace sung Horton Center style or begin with the introduction by moving to about minute 12.

If the key to improv is listening to one another, we are doing well. And if listening to each other that takes us to a place where we're doing new things, and then to another place we didn't think we would find, I believe we're on the right path. May our good deeds be a blessing in God's sight, and may Wisdom continue sending her inspiration.

Faith Formation

Starting Tuesday, November 3rd we will begin our next study based on a book by Peter Gomes: <u>The Good Book: Reading the Bible With Mind and Heart.</u> Available on Amazon for \$13.99 or Kindle version for \$7.99)

The following is a summary of what to expect from this book and this study: Why are so many intelligent and compassionate people embarrassed to say they find wisdom and comfort in the Bible? Why do so many seekers turn to New Age religions instead of the Bible? And how as a society did we come to cede biblical interpretation to those who would use the Bible as a tool for division and exclusion? In this book, Peter Gomes shows how to read the Bible and what it says about the topics that concern us all, including joy, suffering, evil, and goodness. He also explains what the Bible really says about women, gays and lesbians, and people of color. With compassion, humor, and insight, he gives readers the tools and understanding they need to make the ancient wisdom of the Bible a dynamic part of their modern lives.

Stay tuned for our **Advent Study** that will start the first Tuesday in December (December 1st). This Advent we will use the devotional by John Pavlovitz entitled "Low: An Honest Advent Devotional". The devotional is available on Amazon for around \$5.

A summary of the devotional: Amidst the bright lights and wrappings of a sentimentally saturated Christmas season, we tend to forget about the gritty, messy reality of the Advent story as it was experienced 2,000 years ago. In this honest Advent devotional, best-selling progressive Christian author John Pavlovitz reminds us that God came to meet us in the low places of our lives -- and that Jesus continues to come low this Advent season. When we plant our feet firmly in the dirt of everyday life, we see Jesus meeting us in the low places: when we live humbly, when we seek forgiveness, in our grief and suffering, when we act on behalf of someone else, when we pray. As we walk the road of Advent, Jesus reminds us the invitation is not to escape this world to an elevated Heaven somewhere else. but to bring Heaven down. "God with us" is Jesus, getting low. Each devotional includes a scripture and Advent reflection on Jesus meeting us on the ground.

Notes from Zimbabwe

Getting to Zimbabwe was a different kind of adventure with Covid - 19. My flight was one of the shortest ones at 23 hours but at Boston, Washington, D.C, Addis Ababa, and Harare, every official wanted to see the results of a Covid test taken 48 hours prior to departure. I waited anxiously for my results which showed up in my email while I was in Boston. The extremely nice folks at United Airlines printed it out for me making life easier. People from around the world were trying to get on my flight in D.C. Many were denied access to various African countries because their test results had "expired" per the country's entry requirements. I was advocating for an elderly lady from Guyana who was almost in tears because she knew no one in DC who could assist her and she simply wanted to get home. I had to become very, very assertive to get her on board. The veranda and the front yard of PKZ central has turned into "Chipinge High Annex." We have 60+ students attending classes to prepare for December exams in English, Math, Science and History. They start coming at 9:30 and leave around 2 p.m. I love that two of the students are older women who bring their children to class. In Form 4 students take these end of year O Level (Ordinary Level) exams. Getting a minimum of five O Level passes is the equivalent of graduating from high school. Students qualify for A Level (Forms 5 & 6) or it becomes an entry level requirement in the job market. The fact that students have been out of school since mid-March means the vast majority of Form 4 students are not prepared to take this once a year national exam.



The Ministry of Primary and Secondary Education isn't allowing these classes to be taught on school grounds, hence the shift to PKZ's fairly sizeable veranda. Teachers quietly went on strike when secondary schools first began a phased reopening. Not only was there no PPE or hand sanitizers for teachers or students, but teacher pay was an issue. Formerly teachers earned about \$500 US a month. When the Zim government converted all US dollars to Zim dollars in March 2019, the struggling

economy collapsed and what teachers now receive in Zim dollars is worth \$40 US a month. No one can live on \$40 a month. I have to do quick calculations every time I walk into the grocery store and see bread prices at \$80 a loaf (about 90 cents in USD) or 1.5 lbs of margarine at \$330 (about \$3.60) Zim money feels like Monopoly money and I need a huge handbag every time I convert \$10 or \$20.

School fees have also increased dramatically and in some cases are 10 times more than a family's monthly earnings. Thankfully, we have US dollars for our sponsored kids so we can stay ahead of the inflation curve. Many children are now at home because going to school is beyond what anyone can afford.



Vrante, the older boys and I did the surprise delivery to Daissy Dube Home a few days ago and brought a lot of food and some things from the container. The kids were thrilled and they said, "But, Connie. Can you help us? We need a lot of things." When we asked them to make a list it included school socks, Vaseline and body lotion, umbrellas (rainy season is coming), sun hats, shoes, belts, and school uniforms. Can you imagine? Nothing extravagant, just some basics. So, we will go through the container boxes. We also plan to have the five oldest girls spend this coming weekend with us, and thanks to your contributions we shall shop. They want to know exactly where I live and it is important for them to have this experience.

Celebrating 100 Years of Women's Suffrage

The first women's rights convention was held in Seneca Falls, NY, in 1848 determined that women should agitate for suffrage. They viewed the right to vote in local and national elections as a means to further other reforms including increased legal rights for married women, control over finances and property, and joint guardianship of children. The Civil War brought the abolition of slavery and the 15th Amendment gave only black men the right to vote. This split the women's suffrage movement and led to two different strategies in fighting for voting rights. The American Women's Suffrage Association sought to attain the right to vote on a state by state basis while and the National Women's Suffrage Association pressured for a federal constitutional amendment. In 1890 these associations merged into the National American Suffrage Association and their efforts were finally successful. On August 21, 1920 Congress approved the 19th Amendment which gave women the right to vote.
