The bookends of this year-long process was the formation of the Pastoral Search Committee in early November 2019 and ending with the Congregational Meeting which affirmed the call of our candidate as pastor on November 22, 2020. We cannot be happier!

Many thanks go to Carol Lundgren, Harriet Wilson, and Judy Trepal for the detailed, professional and comprehensive FCCW profile which was posted on the UCC.org website available for all searching ministers to view. It was extremely helpful to the Search and Call committee as they worked to match the ministers' qualifications and experience to those desired for a new settled pastor by the FCCW congregate as a whole.

Patience and commitment to the process came to fruition when the Holy Spirit brought Dr. Tere to our attention. Almost immediately connections were discovered, bonds were formed and the five Search members were excited! Dr. Terrilyn Krueger was our candidate. After she accepted our offer of a call, within 3 to 4 weeks we presented 'Doc' to the congregation where she was overwhelmingly approved as the next settled Minister of FCCW.

Special thanks go to the 'ZOOM Team' who helped coordinate the technology that allowed us to virtually hold a Candidating Weekend and Worship Service to conclude the search. Julie Margolis, Margie Galabrun, Max Gehring, Julie Kessler, Alan Bernier and Nate Fogg combined talents to make it happen. It was important that the limited number of people who were not comfortable with the ZOOM platform had an opportunity to 'meet' Tere in a Covid compliant gathering at the church while the rest safely participated from home. George Ackerman was the perfect host for the 'Meet and Greet' on Saturday.

And, last, and MOST IMPORTANTLY, we would like to thank Dr. Tere (Terrilyn, 'Doc') Krueger. The members of the Search and Call team do not have a doubt that she was the one and only minister the Holy Spirit has intended to pastor us. She is congenial, talented, witty, creative, understanding and FILLED with energy and eagerness. She will move and inspire our church to do even greater things for our community as we enrich our own faith and worship. Faith Formation

Our four-week Advent Study will begin the first Tuesday in December (December 1st). This Advent we will use the devotional by John Pavlovitz entitled "Low: An Honest Advent Devotional". The devotional is available on Amazon for around \$5.

A summary of the devotional:

Amidst the bright lights and wrappings of a sentimentally saturated Christmas season, we tend to forget about the gritty, messy reality of the Advent story as it was experienced 2,000 years ago. In this honest Advent devotional, best-selling progressive Christian author John Pavlovitz reminds us that God came to meet us in the low places of our lives -- and that Jesus continues to come low this Advent season. When we plant our feet firmly in the dirt of everyday life, we see Jesus meeting us in the low places: when we live humbly, when we seek forgiveness, in our grief and suffering, when we act on behalf of someone else, when we pray. As we walk the road of Advent. Jesus reminds us the invitation is not to escape this world to an elevated Heaven somewhere else, but to bring Heaven down. "God with us" is Jesus, getting low. Each devotional includes a scripture and Advent reflection on Jesus meeting us on the ground.

And come the new year, we will pick up where we left off with our study of Peter Gomes: The Good Book: Reading the Bible With Mind and Heart. (Note: Amazon has the book for 13.99/Kindle version for 7.99).

Our class will restart on Tuesday, January 5th with chapter 6. If you weren't with us in November for the start of this study, it's not too late to join! We're one chapter into the 2nd part of the book which delves into how to view the "hot" topics of today against what the Bible has to say. The first three January classes will focus on:

January 5 - The Bible and Anti-Semitism January 12 - The Bible and Women: The Conflicts of Inclusion January 19 - The Bible and Homosexuality: The Last

January 19 - The Bible and Homosexuality: The Last Prejudice

News from Zimbabwe

"It's a different kind of a life when you don't have to worry if you will eat."

This powerful statement was made in deep gratitude by Samuel Khumbula as we sat around the dining room table preparing to give thanks for the food in front of us.

And Sam knows of what he speaks. When he was 11 his mother left in the night and Sam had to step up and take care of his two younger brothers, Joshua and Tanaka, who were 8 and 4. For the next three years Sam had to figure out how to provide food for the three of them. The younger boys didn't want to go to school because they didn't have "buns" like the other kids did. Sam would say, "Do I go to school with buns? No, so you have to do as I do." "But other kids have a lunch box with buns." Sam would say, "But we are different from them. Maybe tomorrow we will have buns like they do today." Sam said he didn't know if they would have the mealie-meal to make improvised buns but he wanted to give them hope. He continued in this way for the next three years tending a garden, and doing odd jobs in his rural village in exchange for food, until he moved on to high school -- an eight hour walk from his home village -- and placed the younger brothers in the care of relatives. Sam would live in one of the high school's storage rooms, work for bits of food, and wouldn't return to see his brothers for the next four years. (Sam would complete high school #1 in his class. He came to Chipinge to go to honors level for Form 5 & now Form 6. He has been under PKZ sponsorship since January 2020 and still remains #1 in his class.)

A UN report names Zimbabwe as one of the world's top global food crises, facing the worst hunger crisis in a decade, with 5.5 million people food insecure. Even those who are receiving supplemental food aid have huge gaps. This week when PKZ brought the monthly supply of food to the Daisy Dube Children's Home (primarily protein and vegetables) it was disheartening to open the refrigerator and the freezer and find both empty. I don't know how many days these kids existed on sadza only.

Samuel has been impressed by the love and care shown by FCCW and he has enjoyed sitting in on the ZOOM meetings and recognizing faces which are now familiar to him. He felt moved to write the following:

"It is a blessing for me to have an opportunity to say words that can reach you. I would like to thank you for the love that you give us. Regardless of the good life that you are living, you find it worthy to help the people of Zimbabwe. It was hard for me and my brothers to avail food at the table. Some families are even worse than mine. Your help has been fruitful. So many Zimbabweans are grateful for your love! I assure you that your wells will never run dry. Your intercessions are not in vain; this allows new ways to be made open! Please keep praying for us. God bless you all!"

I thank you deeply for the love and care you continue to show through your support of the children and the various mission projects. Your Alternative Giving gifts at Christmas provide hope and love and light. You are a blessing to the people of Zimbabwe and to me.

Dawn's Gathering

As I ease into the 100-degree bubbling water of our hot tub. I reach for the cup of coffee that I carried with me. Settling into the swirling waters I sip and listen to the soft awakening of the day. There is no wind this morning. The chimes and flags that encompass the tree branches are motionless waiting for the first soft breeze to release them from their slumber. The grey haze of dawn lifts as the images of the trees start to take form. A squirrel nimbly leaps from tree to tree via the highway of branches that connect a canopy of leafless arteries. Suspended on a cable among the cluster of trees is an assortment of bird feeders; tube and platform feeders filled with black oil sunflower seeds, and a suet feeder containing two blocks of compressed morsels of grains. I challenge myself to a contest of selecting which kind of bird will arrive first. The gentle chick-a-dee lands on one of the platforms and chooses a seed, then returns to a branch and begins the negotiation of prying open the shell to get to the prize within. This will provide the energy it needs to combat against today's freezing temperatures. Next, as if answering an invitation, several blue jays with their azure plumage, drop onto the platform feeders. Their noisy entrance is announced as they flutter from the upper branches landing with a thud creating a carousel effect spinning but not dislodging their passengers. These birds don't crack open the shell, they select a seed, toss back their heads, and swallow it whole. Their almost manic attack creates a cascade of the treasured items to fall to the ground where a small but stalwart collection of juncos receive the shower the blue jays have provided. Their slate and charcoal backs are resting in their cup of white bellies. If there was snow on the ground it would appear as if they acquired their contrasting colors by swiping their bellies through the wintery flakes.

I rest quietly allowing the healing water to caress the muscles and joints that have recently caused me to wake with stiffness and an almost humorous snap, crackle, pop cacophony of sounds. Resting my head on the edge of the tub I hear the rustling of leaves as an army of turkey race through the woods descending upon the ground below the feeders. These awkward fowl shuffle and swirl in a competitive dance as they gather their cherished morsels. I watch over the edge of the hot tub as they cock their heads and return my gaze in a comical almost eyebrow raising manner. They appear to be saying, "I'm watching you too". More birds come and go, the nut hatch, doves, and an array of woodpeckers. Each vying for the life sustaining reward. Each entrenched in the symbiotic relationship of survival.

As we move through the season of Advent we await not just the arrival of the Christ child, but also the scientific discoveries of a vaccine that will release us from the stifling restrictions which keep us from being close with our family and friends. Let us rest in the knowledge that this contagion will not concur us. Let us breath-in the love and joy that the Holy Spirit provides during this time of anticipation. Let us share, like the birds, the life sustaining morsels of song, prayer, and hope. Be well my friends and stay calm with the notion that someday soon we will rejoin our Congregational flock within our beloved sanctuary. Until then, peace be with you.
