# THE PASTOR'S PAGE

#### Let Go -- Into POWER!

During my recent vacation, I had the awesome experience of letting go of some emotional baggage that I had taken on, copied, absorbed from my parents. After my last sermon (5/23) when I shared an exercise that can lead, through the Spirit, to freedom, I heard that a number of people had great experiences of "letting go" during the reflection. So, I want to offer an exercise here and a prayer to make it effective for you—through the Holy Spirit! Know that the Holy Spirit is ready to take our burdens off our backs! But, the question is, are we ready to give them up?

In preparation for that sermon, I was so taken by the words Jesus spoke to his disciples about what we now know was Pentecost—and after. "When the Holy Spirit comes upon you, you will be filled with **POWER**..."\* It's the kind of Power that gives us hope, strength, self-mastery—the ability to do God's calling. Cool, eh?!

The burdens and baggage I'm referencing are emotions, thoughts, world-views, assumptions, addictions, behaviors that make us feel power-LESS. Being FREE to make choices about where we will put our energy is an awe-some place to be. HOW do we become free? Ironically, we are free when we surrender ourselves, our will, our egos to the Holy Spirit.

Of what should I "let go" you ask? BAGGAGE that is not yours or that you do NOT wish to live out anymore, period. It might be feelings like anxiety, powerlessness, depression fear, shame, guilt, long-held ideas, thoughts that are toxic, negative or judgmental—toward yourself and others.

"The desires of ego (hollow self-pride) are opposed to the Spirit . are continually in conflict so you are not free but are prevented from doing what you desire to do."\*\*

Prayer. "Holy Spirit, I ask you to come now. Fill me. Take away all the burdens I don't need to carry. I surrender them to you and Your indwelling power. Thank You. In Jesus' name. Amen.

#### **EXERCISE**

I breathe deeply, slowly, consciously for a few breaths—relaxing into You.

I pray and open to You, letting go of all that is not mine to carry anymore. I let go of my burdens and baggage. I sit in silence for a moment and visualize Light coming into me through the crown of my head. Spirit, fill me, free me through Your power. Amen.


#### From the Assistant Treasurer

# Faith Formation Book Discussion



Our faith formation class through the month of June will continue to focus on Lillian Daniel's book: "When Spiritual but Not Religious Is Not Enough: Seeing God in Surprising Places, Even the Church" Each chapter stands on its own and lends itself to lively discussion. Therefore, you can jump into this study at any time and still come away with a very meaningful class experience

regardless if you've missed one or more classes.

The following is a brief description of the book:
"The phrase "I'm spiritual but not religious" has become a cliché. It's easy to find God amid the convenience of self-styled spirituality -- but is it possible (and more worthwhile) to search for God through religion?

Minister and celebrated author Lillian Daniel gives a new spin on church with stories of what a life of faith can really be: weird, wondrous, and well worth trying. From a rock-and-roller sexton to a BB gun-toting grandma, a church service attended by animals to a group of unlikely theologians at Sing Sing, Daniel shows us a portrait of church that is flawed, fallible -- and deeply faithful. With poignant reflections and sly wit, Daniel invites all of us to step out of ourselves, dare to become a community, and encounter a God greater than we could ever invent.

Humorous and sincere, this is a book about people finding God in the most unexpected of places: prisons, airports, yoga classes, committee meetings, and, strangest of all, right there in church."

#### Father 'O' Father

We all have a father. For many of us that person in our lives has passed. My father was born in 1914 in Stone Mountain, Georgia. He was a WWII Navy pilot. He was a dreamer and according to my Mama's mother, Daddy was a "Sport". He was 43 by the time I, the baby of six, was born. He and Mama had already raised five children. In fact, their first born was having her first child in December before I came along a couple weeks later in January. No, I'm not "my own grandpa", but close. You might say my relationship with my father was contentious. The changing generations were too radical for my white southern father to accept. As I supported social justice movements from Civil Rights to Women's Rights and the Equal Rights Amendment, Daddy and I seemed to drift apart. He had the values he was raised with, and like most of us as we grow older, we realize that those sometimesrestrictive values don't hold the same meaning. Toward the later years of his life, Daddy and I became friends again. He passed the spring after my 28<sup>th</sup> birthday.

Whether I speak of my Earthly Father or my Heavenly Father the relationship is the same. As a child I was close to Him. I sang songs of praise and walked the path He laid before me. As an inquisitive adolescent I challenged the authority set by Him. I would go out of my way to do the opposite of what my Father wanted for me. Becoming a parent resulted in another change in my relationship with my Father. I sought Him. I needed guidance and was more receptive to the words shared by Him. As I begin these "golden years" I am at peace with my Fathers, and I patiently wait for the day when I walk with them both. Happy Father's Day

But then, for various reasons, perhaps mostly lack of invitation, Team Synergy gatherings began to be attended only by ministry coordinators, and who needs another meeting, right? Back to the drawing board.

Then came our minister's retirement and so much other change that Team Synergy was shuffled to a back burner.

# In-Person Worship to Begin Again in Our Sanctuary

Due to the Covid 19 pandemic, our church building was officially closed to in-person gatherings in March 2020. That was 15 long months ago. However, by embracing new technology, our worship services and the business of church continued with minimal interruption.

Our Deacons worked tirelessly to ensure that we had Pastoral coverage, and constantly cared for us through check -ins and telephone calls. Our ministry programs were revised to meet emerging needs. We stayed as connected as the times would allow.

Leadership Council met regularly via Zoom to discuss how and when to re-open church. The process has been gradual, and our highest priority has always been the health of our congregants and our community. I am happy to announce that Leadership Council has agreed to take the first step in opening the sanctuary to inperson worship.

The hoped-for date of return is June 6<sup>th</sup>, a Communion Sunday. This date is not yet confirmed because we are waiting to see if there is an uptick in Covid cases in our community following the Pride Day event of May 15<sup>th</sup>. More than likely, church will resume in a controlled and modified manner on June 6<sup>th</sup>.

When in-person worship begins, it will be by **reservation only**, and groupings of people in the sanctuary will be controlled. The hardest part of our decision was to agree that, as a **first step to our reopening**, **only vaccinated people will be able to attend worship**, except for children who have not yet been able to be vaccinated, and who are attending with vaccinated parents or guardians.

The Ministry of Building & Grounds and Safe Church will establish safe seating areas, and the Ministry of the Diaconate will control them. If you regularly meet with vaccinated friends, you are invited to sit with them in a church pew "pod". Very shortly, you will be hearing more about the confirmed date of opening and how to make your reservation.

Leadership Council will continue to monitor in-church worship services and will move into phases of wider opening as soon as it is deemed safe to do so. With the assistance of the Diaconate, we will also consider other forms of worship which possibly could be more inclusive


