What's Going On Inside Us Here?

As I sit down to write my monthly greeting to you, I recall that two of you have recently expressed that you feel our church is doing grieving work. This surprised me because what I see are lots of smiles! But, smiling when we're happy to be together does not mean we're not grieving inside.

If you're grieving, I want to be with you—to be a healing presence for you. Let me begin by suggesting that you "dip inside" by which I mean, stop for a few seconds, close your eyes, breathe deeply a few times (e.g. 4-7-8)*. Then ask the question of all those inner parts that make up "you", "Am I grieving a loss now?"

Some facts. 'Grief' is a natural response related to a LOSS of something important to you----a person, place, job, idea, ability, health, change of some sort, etc. For example, what Covid has wrought—sickness, death, separation, no hugs. You may go through a variety of emotions like sadness, depression, hopelessness, fragmentation, loneliness, anger, etc. Grief is a process. Please, give yourself nurture, understanding when you feel grief. It's a process. We can't FORCE ourselves to be 'over it' just because we want to be.

There are 5 stages of grief: denial, anger, bargaining, depression, and acceptance**. It takes a while for us to adapt to a changed situation. And that's ok--normal. It's not ok to get stuck, stay there and become a 'victim'. That's when we must reach out--talk with someone.

I want to share an amazingly poignant story from Titia's book about her husband, Gijs', time of being able to let go into the grief of his father's death.

"Gijs didn't talk much about his father's death. What was the sense? You take a loss and you go on. That's what life had taught him....Yet I noticed Gijs began developing a terrific backache after his father died....A few weeks later, we attended a party....He was having a good time....Suddenly, I saw him in the center of a group of men who put their arms around him, as if they had to support him to remain standing. I rushed over. "He's alright," a friend said. "It's about his dad."***

Deep grief must be shared with another—it's too heavy to be borne alone. And the timing and people to grieve with may vary. When my father died suddenly while I was on my way to Denver, I was told as soon as I came through the door. I had only a few seconds to grieve before I took on the role of the eldest child--caregiver, phone-call informer, organizer--for the rest of the family. (I was still a "toughie" like brother Tim has described me.) When I got home, I was able to grieve his death in therapy.

I love you all and want you to know that I want to share in your grief. I want to be a healing presence in this community--with you. In fact, I believe that's what happened several weeks ago, when, during Joys & Concerns, a member shared his grief about Afghanistan and the horrific losses of veterans and their families. I began my Pastoral Prayer with this and could not immediately go on. I didn't choose to cry. My body was taken over involuntarily by Spirit as my shoulders shook with tears. I've asked Spirit to help me better understand this episode. Not only was I allowed to grieve with the member, but with Spirit who was showing us that God, indeed, grieves with us. Oh my. THANK YOU, GOD! Amen. Truly.



Fishing

It's O-Dark Hundred and the sun is starting to break through the thin Alaskan skyline. At one point in time, I recall even from my childhood, someone must have established that the best time to catch fish is before the crack of dawn. I'm not sure I agree with that theory, but here I am doing the "one foot shuffle" as I dance my way into the neoprene chest waders that are supposed to keep me warm and dry. The guys have gone ahead. The rest of us try to clear our heads and eyes from the sleep that was cut short while making our way down to the Kenai River.

As I maneuver the metal staircase leading to the vertical banks, I listen to the rushing sounds made by the cold, glacier-fed water that provides spawning grounds to tens of thousands of salmon. I hear voices quietly talking but I am unable to distinguish what they are saying. The mood is almost reverent and then someone exclaims "Fish On". Others move aside or reel up their line so the person who has hooked the fish and the helper who is to net the fish conduct an integral tango. As these fellows work as a team to conquer this approximately ten-pound beauty, the fish is doing its best not to be caught. Adding to this struggle is the river itself. The Kenai is rushing with such velocity and pressure against your legs that the waders almost shrink against your flesh. You must be careful not to lose your footing or you might find yourself speeding down-river trying to keep the icy waters from filling your waders and drown.

With my headlight giving guidance, I descend into the frigid water. A slight gasp leaves my lips as I adjust my footing and move gingerly to the spot along the bank where I will begin casting. I use a flyrod, but not a fly. There is a bright neon green piece of yarn tied around a red hook. To catch a Sockeye salmon, you float the line down stream hoping the fish will take it in its mouth. If you snag the fish in the back, or tail, or any place other than the mouth, you must let it go. Quite often the fish will shake the hook off as it leaps and flips into the air in its struggle to be free. Occasionally you might catch a fish who has a few gashes from nets, or other fishing gear like scars received in battle.

I settle into the repetitive actions of flipping my line about twenty feet into the river. It lands slightly upstream and quickly flows downstream. I adjust the fly line and nine-foot rod between my fingers allowing the slack to give way lifting the line out of the water and once again flipping the hook back upstream. I have lost count of how many times I have performed this technique, but it doesn't matter. The sun has risen, and I can see clearly up and down the banks of the river the various fishermen and women trying to obtain their daily quota of three fish. Gulls fly overhead only to swoop down and snatch the remains of filleted carcasses. As I flip and retrieve my line I begin to sing. These two activities, fishing and singing, calms my soul and allows me to be closer to God.

The act of fishing makes me recall the lives of the disciples. Simon, called Peter, and his brother Andrew had been fishing the Sea of Galilee when Jesus came upon them and said, "follow me, and I will make you fish for people" Matthew 5:19. They walked further and met two other brothers, James and John mending their nets. Like the former brothers, they also dropped everything and followed Jesus. Wow! What was it like for those men? What did they experience that made them not hesitate to follow Christ? I must admit, I think I would have reacted like those snagged salmon trying to flip and pull myself off the hook. As I continue to sing and flip, I add a prayer. Lord when and if you call me, help me to be like your Disciples and say, "Hear I am".

Notes from Zimbabwe

The shipping container – weighing 22,707 lbs. with 950 boxes and a variety of crutches, medical equipment, furniture and more – is on its way to Zimbabwe. I cannot thank you enough for your donations of clothing, shoes, peanut butter, school and office supplies, medical supplies, fabric and sewing supplies, books, bedding, linens, computers, athletic supplies, personal care items, children's toys, furniture, carpets, dishes and MORE! Thank you to all who sewed dresses, packed boxes, stored boxes, carried boxes, and helped load boxes onto the waiting trailers of Brian Shipley and Mark Evenson. Donna Ackerman and Brian Shipley were a dynamic duo inside the hot container coordinating Spaulding student volunteers. Ann Bilodeau handled the paperwork of the incoming groups and made sure kids could access the snacks and water. George Ackerman was working with Spaulding volunteers outside the container – not an easy task when there were 30 or so – and kept everything humming along. I deeply, deeply appreciate the Men's Group and others who donated extra money to make sure the costs of shipping were covered. It definitely takes a village and our FCCW village goes far above and beyond and is simply amazing!

The next step is to get all the government licenses and clearance documents in place and await the arrival in late October and early November. I shall be present for the



clearance in Zimbabwe and to oversee the redistribution of boxes to various lorries which will make their way to different areas of the country for distribution. Just think, Christmas 2021 is going to be a bit brighter for Zimbabweans this year because of you!

School reopened on September 6 after a hiatus which began on June 4th. Children have not had access to consistent academics since March 2020. More people are getting vaccinated but, like the USA, many people are still getting sick. I learned three children at the Daisy Dube Children's Home have tested positive this week.

I shall be away when Alternative Giving opportunities take place in November and December. I kindly ask you to remember the children who need sponsorship and to remember the Daisy Dube supplemental feeding program. Food expenses continue to rise. There is absolutely no doubt that the children have remained as healthy as they have due to the vastly improved nutrition with more protein added to their simple diets.
