# THE PASTOR'S PAGE

### A Conversation Starter about LTCR

When I was preaching the other week on marriage, I enjoyed having 3 of you spontaneously share about your relationship. There seems to be some energy here regarding Long-Term Committed Relationships (LTCR). Many at FCCW were or have been together 30, 50, 60+ years!

I asked Titia, a happy survivor of a 61 year LTCR with Gijs, "What are components of a long-term relationship?" she said, "Well, start by looking at the tree." Cool. What about a tree could analogize to a LTCR?" Interesting metaphor! She also said it's important that a couple look at their future together and carve it out for both--not just one; incorporate fulfilling things into both people's lives. Another person said that the foundation must be mutual respect, for another person trust and understanding. What have you found for you?

I heard a story today about a couple who were trying to get pregnant--unsuccessfully. The husband treated his wife ok, but was sometimes sarcastic and argumentative. It was suggested he begin to treat his wife like a queen-according to what she found loving. E.g. 5 love languages are: touch, words of appreciation, time together, gifts, acts of service (e.g. doing X on the "honey-do" list\*). Within a month, sure enough, she was pregnant!

One of my professors who specialized in "happy marriages" found that couples who had more positive communications were together longer and were happier than those who were predominantly negative. He taught communication and said it was that simple. The writer of the book of James would agree. He said it's all about the tongue!

Here are some questions that you may enjoy regarding relationships you may be starting, have had or are in currently. Maybe you can have fun with them.

What attracted you in the first place? (It is said that a person's differences, while initially attracting, often end up being what you most bemoan about him or her! True?

What do you most admire and respect about each other? What has your partner made possible for you? What makes you laugh--together? What's the funniest thing about you and him/her?

Do you ever laugh at what you were like in the beginning of your relationship?

In what ways are you different--even opposites? What has been the effect of these differences? What do you really enjoy doing together?

What are your favorite "love languages" and are they the same for both of you? Did it take a long time to discover what means "love" to him/her?



### **Notes from Zimbabwe**

Greetings to my church family and friends! The past few weeks have flown by and we are in the midst of prepping for the arrival of the shipping container next week!

Two very, very ill men came to my house in Chipinge almost four weeks ago to have access to medical treatment including necessary x-rays and lab work at Chipinge Hospital. A few things struck me. Both men were emaciated yet still had to walk upwards of 10 miles simply to access a ride to get to the nearest town where they could be picked up. When people are ill in Zimbabwe they go to a relative's home for care, in this case Vrante, our PKZ Director. The relative is expected to provide necessary care and pay for all medical expenses. Can you imagine what happens when the relative doesn't have the resources to provide additional food, or medication or doctor's and lab fees? What really struck me was when one of the relatives thanked me for the "powerful medication" I provided that seemed to make all the difference. The powerful medication was ibuprofen and a no name brand cough syrup comparable to Dayquil. Just imagine.

I have met two women who impress me deeply. Beauty Makuyana is probably in her mid-late 30s. She is one of the more than 60 students who show up Monday - Friday from noon to 5:00 p.m. on my veranda to take "extra lessons" from Chipinge High teachers to prepare for her O Level exams. As a teenager she had to drop out of high school when her father died as her family could not afford to send her or her 4 siblings to school. She married, had three children, but always wanted to finish high school. (In Zimbabwe, that is passing a minimum of 5 national exams, called O Level subjects.) She has taken her O levels two other times but did not succeed. Deeply faithful, Beauty is determined that the exams this December will be different. She wants to show her children that you never give up in the desire to achieve your dreams of a better life.

The other woman is Chipo M. Chipo dropped out of primary school in grade 3 to work to help support her family. (Her father had married another woman years earlier and her mother couldn't make it on her own.) Chipo became a maid at the age of 10 and worked for various families. At the age of 15 she was the victim of a traumatic sexual assault. She went to live with an aunt in Harare and work as a maid/nanny. The aunt is a teacher and could see how bright Chipo was so she brought home Form 1 and Form 2 books for her to study. Chipo is a voracious reader so she decided to teach herself. By the age of 21, she wanted to enter Secondary School to take her O levels but schools wouldn't admit her because she didn't have any Grade 7 national exam results. Chipo went to a private, local college to prep for O levels and would pass 7 subjects. Once she had her O levels, she applied to Gaza High School for A levels, where Sam was

at school. She completed A levels with distinction and during her two years at Gaza High, she was elected Prefect, Vice Head Girl, and later became Junior MP (Junior member of Parliament) attending conferences nation wide on a variety of issues. Chipo initially aspired to attend college for law due to her ten year quest to have the man who assaulted her brought to justice. Although she was accepted at three Zimbabwe universities, she didn't have the \$500 per term to attend so for the past three years she has been working one job after another to try to save for college. Chipo, now 27 years of age, came to me just last week after hearing that Sam was attending school in the USA and she wanted to know if I could assist her. Right now we are looking at schools which give significant scholarship in the UK as she looks toward programs in social work. The UK also has a significant Zimbabwean population, a safety net which I feel is critical for success. Chipo said, "I decided not to settle for less in my life. If I am to have a brighter future, I need to do whatever I can to continue my education."

Two courageous, impoverished women with dreams bigger than their hardships. Just imagine.



### Faith Formation - Our Next Study!



Classes will be starting up in November for our next study - this one will be based on a book by John Pavlovitz entitled "If God is Love Don't be a Jerk"

In *If God Is Love, Don't Be a Jerk*, John Pavlovitz examines the bedrock ideas of our religion: the existence of hell, the utility of prayer, the way we treat LGBTQ people, the value of anger, and
