Christmas Healing in the Dark

It's sure getting dark early! Do you feel darker inside too, lately? Many of us are. We are dealing with heightened Covid, uncertainty, trials that are putting racism in our faces, shootings, etc. Because I care for you spiritually, I want to ask, "What's happening inside you? For instance, you hear something on the radio, TV, phone, etc. You become alarmed and additional negative emotions quickly follow. What can we do about this painful, down-spiraling? May I offer some HEALING actions. *I pray you notice Spirit's prompts if there is something(s) here for you!!*

Christmas, the true meaning, is all about God incarnating into this world. Here are ways we can be God's adult children--as co-creators—co-incarnators. YES!

When feeling impacted by a problem, ask: "What is my intention regarding this problem?

Spirit, what can I DO with this information that will positively impact this problem?" Ask, then Listen.

Am I being called to take an action? E.G. to write/call a power-person, contribute time or money to a group, reach out for support (emotional, spiritual...), pray, etc.

Am I being called to Release, Purify negative thoughts/emotions? (See below.)

Am I being called to have a "prayer sentence"? (See below.)

It is so easy to be run off the rails by our thoughts! Monk Thomas Keating (one of my spiritual parents) writes* when we think painful thoughts, we generate upsetting emotions. It would actually be best if we could DROP or LET GO of almost all upsetting thoughts—get out of their grasp. We need only hold onto them long enough to use their energy to motivate action. We need to wake up to our thinking because amazingly, it impacts the world!

FACT. This is physics—because all is energy (Einstein), including thoughts and emotions. We are created to be powerful 'energy transformers'! Negative energy comes at us. Will we transform it—or be engulfed by it? Thoughts are either purifying or poisonous. (Remember when you've been in a room where people are fuming--you felt the heat?) Prayer is one of the most powerful energies we can intend. What if we immediately had a prayer session after reading the news, or after thinking negative thoughts?! Hmm..... Don't Let it Stick—Let Go Quick!

When Keating was asked what we can do about toxic thoughts and feelings, he told the story about an "active prayer sentence" (like an "affirmation"). Having a 'go-to' prayer sentence is powerful. With practice, it becomes automatic, interiorized! It repeats itself inside us! COOL, eh? (In meditation/silent centering prayer, this is like your mantra, sacred word or verse that's repeated over and over to help you break loose from thoughts/emotions. It's not easy to do because we're sooo attached to our mind's thoughts. (Mind is used differently than brain.) We think, what would I do without them? Ha, indeed! Imagine what ELECTRO-POSITIVE divine beings we'd be!

Having a 'prayer sentence' (aspiration) propels us into God's reality. A verse the Desert Fathers & Mothers (pioneers of this work) repeated over and over as they were weaving in their hermitages all day was, "Oh God, come to my assistance. Oh, Lord, make haste to help me!" * You can form your own prayer word/sentence. "Oh God, I trust You." "This is the day You have made; I rejoice (leap for joy) and am glad." "You are so intimately aware of me, God." "Joy to the world, the Lord is come." Share your practice with me, if you like, so I may join you in it.

Gifts Unexpected

There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. 1Corinthians 12:4 NIV

Gifts come in all sorts of shapes, colors and sizes. They may be the unseen gifts like talent, compassion, wisdom, courage, and love. But, sometimes, a gift you have been given is forgotten, misplaced or maybe you didn't recognize it as a gift. Those gifts eventually seem to appear from nowhere.

My story is about a gift that was left packed away for over two and a half decades. It was a small, red, spiralbound journal written in by my Dad during the last several months of his life. He was fighting reoccurring cancer.

I knew he had been writing his 'memoir' quietly in the peace of his bedroom. He titled it "Sliding Down the Other Side of the Hill". As he wrote, he NEVER complained about his illness. He just steadily jotted down as many memories of his childhood and his father's tales as best he could remember them.

He died in 1988 and the journal remained in my father's bedside table for over two years. Eventually, it was moved with a few of his belongings to a box in my basement, still unread by anyone. When I finally had the courage to open the box and read his journal, I realized it was the most precious gift I would ever receive. My Dad's memories are now part of who I am. Gifts I never expected.

Now, after several years of reading snippets from that 33 -year-old, spiral-bound notebook, I have embraced each one of those short stories as a gift from God. The God that my father always loved. Even though I never saw my Dad in a church, it was he who cloaked me with the faith that has settled and grown within me. Not by lessons taught in books nor by 'sit down and listen to me' lectures. But simply by having this man as my father and in my life for 42 years. The faith that tells me every day that I am a child of a loving God. The same God that settled in my father's soul and in his father's. The same God within us all, the greatest Gift of all.

My Christmas prayer is that we live peacefully, love sincerely, and always look for the infinite blessed gifts that encircle us all.


Zimbabwe News



The big news is that the container was cleared last Wednesday. It arrived in Mutare on Sunday night, but because there was no electricity, they couldn't operate certain security gates or the huge mechanism that lifts the container from the truck. That is life in Zimbabwe. One would think that with a huge operation processing hundreds of trucks per day, there would be a back up available. Our container went through the dreaded physical inspection on Monday afternoon which lasted four hours. Our team of eagle eyes were there watching the process as they offloaded just a few boxes to check. Then, one of the ZIMRA agents found prescription medication in a box labelled clothes. (Not an FCCW box.) That meant a whole new ball game as they then offloaded almost 80% of the container. to inspect. ZIMRA loves to find an error like that, in fact, they pounce on those kind of things and threaten to impound the container until we get a medical license which takes weeks. Naturally there is a fine and a storage charge for every day of delay, so our team talked to our clearance agent who talked to Zimra and a "token of appreciation" was exchanged in order for us to get a clearance and avoid the nasty medical

license and confiscation. When we returned on the second day for the clearance, no electricity again so the ZIMRA office couldn't process our paperwork via the computer. (I wanted to lend them our generator.)

As we waited on day two off site in a park in Mutare, I met a lovely woman selling bananas. I was taken with the way in which she artfully balanced the box of bananas, kind of at a tilt, and swayed as she walked gracefully. I learned she started early in the morning, without having eaten breakfast and would have no lunch, and moved throughout the streets until 4 pm to get home for her children. She may make \$2-\$5 a day if she is lucky, just enough to feed her kids.



Words of gratitude have been pouring in from all corners. People at Rufumiso and other churches receiving boxes feel abundantly blessed for being remembered.

Anticipation

My anticipation of that 1969 Christmas morning was intense. I knew something was going to be different. Our family financial status was not one of great abundance, but it was also not one of extreme poverty. Mama always made do with whatever was set before her. If it was clothing, she excelled as a seamstress. If it was food, she could make leftovers taste like a four-star restaurant. Not that I had ever eaten at a four-star restaurant, but I'm sure my Mama would have been able to achieve that kind of rating. Daddy on the other hand had a way of earning money and then spending it frivolously. My brother Vic and I spent many evenings that autumn perusing the Sears and Roebuck or Spiegel catalogs hoping that at least one of the wish-list items we had selected would make it under our Christmas tree. That 1969 Christmas found us living in rural Virginia outside of Norfolk. I was in seventh grade. Our Virginia home was an old plantation style house. It had a huge front porch with four tall columns, a wide walnut staircase, and a "Gone With the Wind" parlor graced with eight-foot-tall sliding pocket doors. In that room was the Christmas tree. Vic and I had already snuck in and shook each wrapped present. We knew there would be the customary socks, underwear, or gloves in the festively wrapped boxes. But Vic was hoping for a new stereo. I wanted a bike. Neither of those items were under the tree, yet.

That Christmas morning, I woke somewhere around 4:00 am. I tip-toed from my room across the hall to Mama and Daddy's. I placed my face inches from Mama's and whispered, "Merry Christmas". She slowly opened one eye, lifted the covers, and scooted over so I could climb in beside her. She wrapped me up in her cozy arms and whispered in return, "Merry Christmas Darlin, but not yet". Realizing I had to wait a couple more hours, I snuggled closer to Mama and in the warmth of her embrace, fell asleep. I woke again a little disoriented as to where I was. I glanced at the clock sitting on Mama's nightstand and it read 6:05. I couldn't take it anymore. I squealed "Merry Christmas" and leaped out of the bed. Mama smiled as she and Daddy reached for their bathrobes and slippers. I ran out into the hall and shouted, "Merry Christmas Vic". He flew open his bedroom door and, in as cool a manner as a fifteen-year-old boy could muster, he ran past me and down the stairs. We met up in front of the parlor doors impatiently waiting for Mama and Daddy to join us. Finally, Vic slid open the doors and we elbowed our way into the room. Instantly he descended to the floor in front of his new stereo. It had a Plexiglas top and black turntable with two separate speakers that I knew would be blasting rock-n-roll music. This of course would cause my Daddy to shout words my young ears weren't supposed to hear. I stood stark still looking all around the room. There were Christmas stockings hanging on the fireplace hearth bulging with a variety of fruit, candy, and small toys. There were wrapped presents of various sizes and shapes. But I didn't see a bike. I slowly walked closer to the tree, searching behind it and looking back to the entrance thinking maybe it was in another corner of the room. Then with the flair of a circus showman Daddy wheeled into the room the most beautiful bike ever. It was Purple! It had high handlebars, with colored streamers flowing from the purple

hand grips, and a purple banana-style seat. I flew across the room and squealed with delight. I gave Mama and Daddy big hugs and proceeded to glide the bike out of the house, down the steps and on to the driveway. In only my PJs, bathrobe, and slippers I straddled the seat and rode like a crazy person down the long dirt driveway to the road and back. I'm not sure how long they watched me. I do know that it was later in the morning when I finally came back into the house to open the rest of my presents. Vic was up in his bedroom blasting Led Zeppelin while Mama filled the house with four-star aromas. Daddy sat in his big Early American chair, smoking his cigarettes, and saying things under his breath while staring at the ceiling where Vic's room vibrated. Many a Christmas has come and gone, but none could compare to that childhood experience.

I believe it was the actual anticipation of waiting and wanting that made that Christmas so extraordinary. Just like the anticipation we experience during this amazing time of Advent. It is the time of preparation, as in the waiting for the birth of the Christ Child, or the return when we will all live in peace and love, free from pain and sorrow. For almost two years, as with the whole world, our small community has endured the ups and downs of viral infections. We have witnessed the loss of loved ones or friends, and the isolation that results in strained emotions. May this Advent be a time of blessings as we maneuver once again the perils of Covid. Let us anticipate, with waiting and wanting, the joys of family and friends in the safest and most loving manner possible.

2021 ALTERNATIVE GIFT GIVING PROGRAM

Alternative gift giving is giving in recognition for the person who has everything to benefit the people who don't. We have an opportunity this Christmas season to consider a gift to any of five worthy programs.

The Feddern Diaconate Discretionary Fund provides temporary emergency assistance to individuals and families in need within our church and within the community.

Heifer International provides livestock and training to individuals or families in need to increase income, food security, and nutrition with a pass it on philosophy. Each person who receives an animal passes on the first offspring to another person/family in need. You can purchase shares of goats, chickens, pigs, rabbits, llamas, buffaloes, heifers and other animals.

Zimbabwean Child Sponsorship makes education a reality. Signs directed to community members in several schools say "Stop early marriage. Give us school fees, not husbands." The sad reality is that orphaned girls have had a limited "career path." Sponsorship provides school fees, uniforms, school supplies to the most disadvantaged and changes the trajectory of their lives.

Daisy Dube Supplemental Food Program provides protein (soya chunks, fish, meat, eggs, peanut butter, etc.) to 18 children living in an orphanage, helping to combat hunger and malnutrition. Having food gives children a sense of worth and freedom of worry about what they will eat or if they will eat.

Re-usable Sanitary Supply Project

Girls miss a week of school each month due to lack of sanitary resources. Washable, reusable sanitary pads provide a sense of dignity and empowerment and allows girls to stay in school.

Our members and friends have a long history of sharing their resources with others during the Christmas season.
