Peace that Passes Understanding

We watched two minutes of Martin Luther King's last sermon. The date: April 3, 1968. You could see the strain of the last days of constant threats to his life: "You won't leave Memphis alive". His voice cracked as he said, "I may not make it with you to the Promised Land, but that's ok because I have been to the mountain *-top... I know you will make it....Longevity of life has its place, but...I only want to do God's will*."

He was viciously shot dead the next day. Could it possibly be that he was experiencing a joyful moment doing God's will in his last moment? You see, we discovered he died with a smile on his face, which a young woman had seen seconds before. When I relayed the story of Clare Jean Ester, I was so powerfully touched by the confluence of these 2 stories—that I kept weeping as I felt amazement and grief, joy and sorrow. What did you feel? I so yearn for racial unity with all our brothers and sisters who are made in the image of God! Do you, too?

OMLord & and my God! In spite of weaknesses, he was a strong man of God. Yes! MLK clearly sought and received God's Peace in the valley of the shadow of death. He knew and yet he stayed.

He knew the Peace purchased with blood that flowed out of Love. He allowed himself to lead right in the center of life's electric storms, hated, reviled. In 1956, the first of many of his houses was damaged or destroyed by bombs. Many friends gathered at his home, angry and defiant. He calmed them. *"We will continue a path of Non-violence and Love."* He was more interested in Living the Gospel of ultimate Love than merely churchifying it. He was more interested in raising his level of consciousness than reacting to violence with hate. Can we also shine our lights of kindness-regardless of how we are treated?

MLK was a man imbued with Christ's Peace, Courage, Strength. I'm heartened to know he was smiling when he died. "Oh God. May we be so committed in our calling as followers of Jesus that we too seek the peace that passes understanding instead of seeking lives of luxury and safety. Help us. Amen."

Love

What is love? This is the ultimate mystery passed down through the ages. For centuries writers, artists, and musicians have dedicated their lives to addressing this mystery. The Beatles sing, "All You Need is Love". Love occurs between spouses or partners. Love is found between siblings. A parent and child love are everlasting. Grandparents and their grandchildren hold a special kind of love. There is the love of nature, certain foods, favorite books, colors, sport teams, movies ... Oh My Goodness. Maybe we use the word "love" too frivolously. I know my love for George is immeasurable. But do I really love jazz, or do I just prefer it over other styles? I know I love music. I'm not sure what my world would be like without it. Ahh, maybe that's it! Is "true" love based on the intensity or passion with which one associates with that person or thing? All this talk of love derives our from celebration or at least acknowledgement of February 14th, Valentine's Day.

Please indulge me as I put on my Historian Hat and share the origins of this special day. The Catholic Church recognizes three Saints named Valentine. During the reign of Emperor Claudius II, who decided that unmarried men made better soldiers, outlawed marriage for young men. Saint Valentine, thinking that was cruel, defied the order and preformed marriages in secret. Of course, Claudius found out and had the Saint beheaded. Some say it was Saint Valentine of Terni, a Bishop, who is the true namesake. Claudius had him beheaded as well. The third Valentine was one who, in his passion to help Christians escape from Roman prisons, found himself a prisoner. He supposedly fell in love with the jailor's daughter and wrote her letters signed, "From Your Valentine". As for celebrating a special day in February, some say it originated with the Christianizing of citizens in connection to a Pagan celebration of "Lupercalia" a fertility festival dedicated to the Roman God Faunus. This involved the slaughtering of a goat, smearing its blood on a strip of hide, and slapping young women in the face with it. I think I prefer chocolates. It was not until the 5th Century that Pope Gilasius declared February 14th as St. Valentine's Day.

Based on various Bible interpretations, we find the King James Version mentions love 310 times. The New Revised Standard Version mentions love 538 times. And not to be outdone, the New Living Translation Bible mentions the word love 898 times. In my research, using the Young's Analytical Concordance, out of all the Greek, Hebrew, and Aramaic translations, the word Agape is used the most. "Agape" means the Love of God in manifestation. "God so loved the world "... says John 3:16a. We are to be "rooted and grounded in love", says Ephesians 3: 17b. The author of Ephesians tells us in 3:19, that we are to "know the love of Christ that surpasses all knowledge so we may be filled with all the fullness of God". To be filled with God is to be filled with love. The book of John chapter 15 is packed full of the word love. In verse 9 Jesus says, "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love". I'm pretty sure that whichever translation you use, you will find that God is Love.

As we move through another winter month, celebrate every day with God's Agape love. Manifest and spread the love of God to all you encounter. Oh, and Happy Valentine's Day.

News of Our Partners in Zimbabwe



As we shiver in subzero temperatures, our brothers and sisters at Rufumiso UCCZ are experiencing temps hovering around 40 degrees Celsius. (That's 104 degrees Fahrenheit.) The months from November through March make up "rainy season" and there has been off and on rain but nothing very consistent. So people trying to grow crops in the low veld area of Birchenough Bridge where Rufumiso is located face a lot of challenges. The rain hasn't been substantial enough to allow for good planting. Often fields need to be replanted. The government has promised support for what they call "inputs" for farming but that tends to be distributed along political lines. The need for food security is overwhelming. PKZ recently provided approx. 300 lbs. of maize seed to assist 25 families, all made possible by Wake-field community monetary donations.

The Rufumiso Church members were thrilled to receive FCCW boxes from the recent shipping container. Representatives from every preaching point (sub groups under the "mother church" of Rufumiso) were present for the distribution. The texts came flooding in:

"People were very happy to receive goods from our partners with great love."; "On behalf of Goko High School staff, learners and the Parents Assembly I would like express our heart felt gratitude for the generosity and continued support. These books will go a long way to improve our learners' performance."; "We all praised the Lord and humbly say thank you so much for the goods."; "The dedicated commitment and love remain unparalleled and unrivaled." "May the Lord continue to add more blessings to Wakefield Church members."

Importantly Christmas is celebrated and enjoyed if a child or an adult has one new article of clothing to wear on that special day. There were so many smiles across Zimbabwe on Christmas this year. Thank you for providing light and hope and love! FCCW is a blessing to so many!

Max's Irish Adventure

Some of you may recall a sermon I gave in church a few months ago when I brought up the concept of Nonviolent Communication. When I talked about it, I offered Nonviolent Communication, or NVC, as a way to deal with a conflict in the example of a couple sharing a car ride together and one of these people are uncomfortable with how the other is acting. I went on to explain how NVC offers a way for a person to understand a situation, express how they feel in the situation and why they feel that way, and how to make a request to anyone else around them without making it into a command or order. In short, NVC can be used to resolve issues between people, or even within oneself.

From February 24th to March 5th, I have an opportunity to attend an International Intensive Training (a sort of immersive workshop), or IIT, where I and dozens of others will be embracing NVC. We will learn about NVC from dedicated teachers and from each other, as we'll have presentations to study and moments to share NVC in small group settings. When it comes to sharing interpersonally and within a group, NVC is used more often to express oneself honestly and understand others intimately than to resolve conflict.

I am excited about this opportunity and I truly think of it as me living out my reason for being - the purpose that I've chosen for myself. I first learned about NVC about seven years ago and have learned bits and pieces here and there. In 2021, I attended a portion of a worldwide conference event online -- similar to the UCC's General Synod, just with less business. That really helped me to understand NVC in a multitude of ways. I want to embrace nonviolent communication even further so I am more prepared and feel more comfortable using it and sharing it with others. After the IIT, I plan to share NVC frequently and freely, which would look like a scheduled event or two at FCCW with an opportunity to practice NVC! This sort of event would be of no cost to those participating, and all would be welcome. I only desire to share NVC with others and would be overjoyed to share it with my FCCW family.

Now, for some details about the trip and my expenditures. I will preface by saying that the IIT is nine days and I plan to stay across "the pond" for an additional week to visit with my sister, her family, and my brother. I am not including that additional stay in the cost estimates below. As of right now, if I were to purchase travel tickets and sign up for the cheapest room option, the total estimated cost of this trip is approximately \$3500. This price estimate includes the \$1989 cost for tuition, \$400-700 for a hotel room shared with others, and about \$700-1000 for travel.



Their stories thaw our stiff hearts and wake us to greater compassion which is what Lent, meaning "springtime," has always been for. These stories also wake in us a wild hope that from all this death and ruin, something new could rise. The promise of Lent is that something new will rise. In fact, as these stories also attest, our hope, though wild, is not impossible and is already loose in the world.

Looking Back By Titia Bozuwa

After living in the same house for 63 years, it's time to get rid of "stuff." I don't think of myself as a packrat, but closets full of "things" stare at me. What to throw away? How do you part with things that jog your memory?

From a drawer with scarfs a small jewelry box emerges. I remember it from my youth. Apparently, I had judged it important enough to take with me on our emigration adventure. A small heap of silver beads lay inside, blackened by years of neglect. As I lift them up, I notice a cross attached to them. And then it comes back to me: that amazing happening toward the end of WW II.

My home town was under siege. I had spent days in the cellar with my family. The Germans did not easily give up the fight. Finally, we could go upstairs. Our house was still standing. Soldiers stalking down the street, guns at the ready, wore badges with the word Poland on their sleeves. They told us to get back inside. The fight was not over yet.

A few days later - most of the city now secured - I stood with my father on the sidewalk. A column of tanks and trucks, preceded by a troop of soldiers in battle dress, moved down the street. I had seen many soldiers and tanks over the course of the war. We lived in a military town. But this was different. Instead of palpable fear and disgust, the public stood in awe and cheered our liberators.

I had wormed myself to the front. A BrenGun Carrier passed by. It suddenly screeched to a stop. I felt myself lifted up and put on the front of the tank. I looked into the face of an officer. Under his helmet his eyes filled with tears. He reached inside his breast pocket and pressed something into my hand. "For you." And to my father, "She looks just like my daughter."

I was kissed on both cheeks and lowered to the pavement. The tank moved on, its treads screeching over the cobblestones. I was stunned. With the treasure held tightly in my hand, I ran home to show my mother.

"That's a rosary, Titia... He gave you his own rosary!" She said this with as much emotion as I had seen on the officer's face.

Now, 78 years later, I understand better the emotions that surrounded that split-moment happening. At age twelve, I felt mostly excitement and wonder at being chosen. I did not know that Poland was invaded by the Germans; how hard the Poles had fought, how bitter they felt in defeat. I was told that many Polish military, rather than surrender, had made their perilous way to Portugal through Nazi occupied countries, and sailed to Scotland to regroup and form a brigade - the brigade that had now liberated my city. I was too young to realize the hardships and dangers of their incredible journey. Most of all, I had only vague appreciation for what it must have been like to leave a daughter behind at the mercy of a merciless enemy. What to do with a rosary, when you are brought up Protestant? Just days before, my brothers and I had snickered at our neighbor, who had spent the entire time spent in the cellar sitting on a chair mumbling with a rosary in her hands. What was a rosary for? The explanation I was given baffled me. I had been given someone's treasure that I did not know how to use! It made me feel slightly guilty. That's how it got to stay in the jewelry box.

The beads have regained their silver luster after a thorough polishing session. They represent something I now understand well: meditation. Both Reverend Mary and Reverend Tere have taught and emphasized the importance of turning inward, of seeking the peace of stillness, of "letting go", and taking a deep breath. After all these years, I can picture the Polish officer letting the beads run through his hands and finding solace while his mind overflowed with worries about his wife and daughter. The many years that separate me from the thrill of receiving a gift from a liberator have provided insight into what it means to lose what is most precious; how to turn fear and anxiety into the power of positive thinking through prayer. How emptying your overly busy consciousness brings you back to yourself. And if little silver beads help you to get there, so much the better!

To feel God's love and protection MEDITATE !! Thanks be to God that our church teaches us how to practice it.
