### **An Awesome Lent**

When I was in high school in Grand Rapids, Michigan, I was a preacher's kid in a denomination that did NOT observe Ash Wednesday or Lent. I heard friends ask each other, *What are you giving up for Lent?* Because I wasn't curious enough—and believing "my church/denomination" was superior—I assumed whatever this lent-thing was, it just wasn't important. UGH!

Now, I see Lent as a wonderful opportunity to support one's "better angels". And, it does NOT have to be "dark" as we examine our inner landscape. It's a time to ask God, "What needs healing in me? Am I sick of any of the ways I think or feel? Show me how to transform my life, God." The 40 day season of Lent provides a good opportunity to establish a new practice, discipline, way of thinking, break a habit, create a new one, get support to tackle an addiction. I have a radical idea. What if we decided to Give Up Negative Thoughts and Feelings for Lent?! One huge negative thought form is worry. *WORRYING is a way of praying for the worst outcome!* 

CRAZY behavior, right?! Worry is based on the LIE that we are alone—because God IS with us, ha, even With-IN us. As God's child, what if we imagine our inner worrier--as if it is a young part of us? Thank it for its input because it's trying to protect us in the way it has learned. Then, we "hold" that part, with our Compassionate Adult who dissolves the worry.

What if we were to practice this visualization every day during Lent? What it if freed us to see more Spirit-led mo
ments, and moments where God is working?

Our thoughts can move from: I'm worried about \_\_\_\_ who is sick -> I see \_\_\_\_ healed in God's Light. Now THAT is a Powerful Prayer!

There is a charming little book *Pollyanna*, written by New Hampshire author Eleanor Porter. In it, this poor little girl who had asked the mission society for a doll, sadly receives crutches instead. Seeing her pain, her father asks her to play a special game with him. "Think of something for which you can be "GLAD" in this situation, Pollyanna. Just think. You don't need these crutches because your legs are strong! Isn't that wonderful?"

He teaches her to play the "glad game" that gives even "negative" things in her life a joyful twist in perception. In incident after incident, she kindly but persistently offers new "gladnesses" to people who are stuck in bitterness and infirmity. This spiritual outlook brings them new life.

Hmm. Choosing Gratitude is a fresh interpretation of "Pollyannaish" vs. seeing it only as denial--isn't it? Dear God. Help us through the dark, tough moments. Enable us to give up our crutches of worry as we see Your nearness. Empower us to more often, use our legs of faith. Amen. Because You love us.

#### **News of Zimbabwe**

Thank you ever so much for your continuing support of vulnerable youth through Friends of Orphan Trust led by Joseph Sibiya and Project Kuchengetedza Zviwanikwa (PKZ) led by Vrante Mahlupeko. We currently have 42 children under sponsorship, many supported by FCCW members and friends.

Joseph has been sending updated photos of the FOOT children and a message about the improvements at Dzika, a rural, isolated village near the UCCZ mission of Chikore. Some of the PKZ/Z Team's earlier projects involved rebuilding Dzika Primary School classroom by classroom, bringing electricity to the village in order to retain teachers, coordinating an income generating project of goats and chickens for orphans and child headed households, rebuilding the most treacherous parts of the only road going into Dzika so a drilling rig could pass through, drilling a new borehole and renovating two existing ones and consistent allocations of clothing, school and medical supplies via the shipping containers.



Joseph writes: "Standing on a solid FOOT foundation, Dzika is no longer the same. There are now three boreholes. There is plenty of water supply. Right at the site of our borehole there is now a nutrition garden which accommodates almost all residents. Some donors are now able to get to Dzika using the road that you financed. Gadaufe Road (ed note: literally means 'drive it and die') was never used by big and long trucks for decades until you helped

FOOT to make it. Water is pumped from another borehole to Dzika school into water tanks and supplies the garden with sufficient water using solar as a source of power. You can see how FOOT impacted the Dzika community and others who come for the garden. We feel great as a successful team."

We appreciate every bit of the support that comes our way that enables our programs to continue.

## Growing in Faith – A Reflection by Linda Messer

I've received the Daily Devotionals from the UCC website since late 2016, shortly after I became a member of FCCW. Around that same time, I started using an online journal called Penzu. Often one of the devotionals would 'inspire' me to write so Penzu seemed like the perfect place to put my thoughts 'on paper'. I just wrote my feelings, not considering grammar, sentence structure spelling, etc. Just what was in my heart.

What I didn't know early on was that on a random, yearly anniversary of what I had written, the app would send me an email reminder of my entry. I find that when I reread my 'old self' stuff, sometimes a year or more later, I have absolutely no recollection of what I had written. But it is reassuring and satisfying because I can really appreciate how much FCCW's adult Faith Formation group has helped me to grow in spirit and faith.

In 2018, after reading Mary Luti's Lenten devotional "But Who" on February 24th, I had written my thoughts about it which I've shared below. Now it seems wonderfully humbling for me to read what I believed 4 years ago!! I thought then I had figured out everything I needed to know about faith and religion. But obviously, I had not....not everything!. And that's the beauty of faith. It is always evolving!

"Everyone's wondering who Jesus is" begins Ms. Luti's piece. And for so many, still, the question is fresh. Is he God? A prophet? A teacher with an amazing gift? The answer for me is all of the above and so much more.

I learned the historical story of Jesus only later in life. And, having always believed in only one God, I never questioned who Jesus really was. I've always explained the Trinity in this childlike way: God was the Creator of all things who came to earth as Jesus and sent all his messages to humans in the form of the Holy Spirit. Simple.... Not quite! But therein lies the 'Mystery' of faith. This 'mystery' is why my faith is so vibrant, so living, so day to day with renewed experiences of God in my life. So real. Wanting to know more, keeps me questioning with a sustained awareness that God may present at any time, any place for any reason, in any form.

I did not always feel so connected to God. I did not always really 'know' Him/Jesus in the true sense of a 'believer'. That is why Ms. Luti's words "I'm convinced he always knows me" resonates so strongly with


me. I now believe what God's 'saving grace' means is this: God has been, is now and will ALWAYS be with me and He knows my name.

A synopsis of this study: Pangolins and polar bears, olms, lemurs, and leopards. We share this beautiful blue -green globe with creatures magnificent, delicate, intricate—and now vanishing at a faster rate than at any other time in Earth's history. Spend Lent with twentyfive of these wild ones. Vivid descriptions of their lives will fill readers with wonder—and grief at what they suffer on a planet shaped by human choices. Their stories thaw our stiff hearts and wake us to greater compassion—which is what Lent, meaning "springtime," has always been for. These stories also wake in us a wild hope that from all this death and ruin, something new could rise. The promise of Lent is that something new will rise. In fact, as these stories also attest, our hope, though wild, is not impossible and is already loose in the world.
