"Is Excitement, Joy Back?!"

The enthusiasm was tangible—which is saying something for 10 am on a Saturday—Right?! Team Synergy—oh, did we brainstorm! There was much great dialogue which I will touch on. I hope you "sense" the energy we felt! I'll abbreviate. My comments are in ().

"Intergenerational" questions = huge interest. Every demographic sees import/enjoyability connecting with all ages—is an 'extended family' for many. We have more youth —thx Gina, Julie E and others for creating youth group, including families not at church. What about reestablishing "children's area in rear of sanctuary with age-appropriate things?

Younger parents asked for help. Enormously overburdened with family/school & being asked to do more at church can feel like a job. Would help if there were ways of giving & receiving. *Can there be a media tool—like an instant bulletin board--where members can communicate needs, wants to each other quickly. E.G. *"Is anyone up for a* concert, hike, cup of tea? Could anyone help-- who is in Rochester now? I'm sick, need a meal tonight." 'Messenger' a way to connect & quickly?

Monthly evening weekday meal provided at church; Pancake breakfast; Potluck 1x per month; Church Family Retreat? Volunteers, Men's group Parish Helpers. . .

Church School? Good place for kids to learn stories, give respite time for parents in service. This topic has come up yet again because is important but complicated. How provide but not burden just a few people; pay for it? Do we truly care about children learning?

Can we have simple plan to act on as there is weekly need with kids in church? If have simple enough Bible story materials, people could sign up for a few weeks a year to be available when children are present. CLA can oversee sign-up. Safe church: need a 2nd person present. Let's keep accepting kids, noise & all. (Let's pray to see what ideas Spirit offers. I believe "if we build it, they will come".)

Zoom? Valued enough to stay? Many positive responses—sick, shut-in's, elderly, snowbirds, vacationers, and encouragement that our robustness is "in-person".

Need some money & volunteers for more effective technology to help a weary tech team. Have contribution available to get earphone system in sanctuary for those who are hard of hearing. Who can research and purchase?

Question: Is our focus on Endowment Fund not allowing a view to and asking for current needs to be met & preventing brainstorming of new initiatives to excite our church and provide vital outreach? Some may require teaming up with other groups outside our church? Being church in the present time is important, while protecting financials. (AMEN!! Can you see how valuable, productive, how positive our time together was? **Do you see an idea here that you are drawn to?** And, are you in rhythm with yourself? Do you rest when you need to rest? God wants us to "be" & "do".)

Dear God. Thank You for our Church—caring people who are making a difference in Wakefield and beyond. Give us discerning minds and hearts to Hear Your Call and to Grow in Love and Care. Amen.

From the Treasurers

First of all, a huge thank you to all of you contributors who have enabled FCCW to survive nd thrive throughout the this pandemic. Two years ago, we had no idea what the future would hold for us. But, you came through, and we are stronger than ever.

We instituted an online opportunity to donate, and lots of people have taken advantage of it. We want to be sure that you understand just how it works:

1. If you donate through our website with the donate button, it goes through PayPal, who charges us a fee for this service. A \$100 donation is reduced by \$2.48, so we actually receive \$97.52. This method can be used to pay for any and all church functions, for example—soup, mugs, yard sale, Zimbabwe. Our assistant Treasurer can access this money at will.

2. You can also donate through Facebook (you do not need a Facebook account). Facebook does not charge a fee, and remits monthly to us. I don't think Facebook allows you to specify where your donation goes. But you can email Julie Kessler (julielouisekessler@gmail.com) to inform her of your intent.

The author gives a new spin on church with stories of what a life of faith can really be: weird, wondrous, and well worth trying. From a rock-and-roller sexton to a BB gun-toting grandma, a church service attended by animals to a group of unlikely theologians at Sing Sing, Daniel shows us a portrait of church that is flawed, fallible -- and deeply faithful. With poignant reflections and sly wit, Daniel invites all of us to step out of ourselves, dare to become a community, and encounter a God greater than we could invent.

Humorous and sincere, this is a book about people finding God in the most unexpected of places: prisons, airports, yoga classes, committee meetings, and, strangest of all, right there in church. Source: Amazon
