The Journey of Lent

Greetings dear ones. I sit here on this Ash Wednesday, ready to embark on this 2023 journey through Lent. Ash Wednesday is the beginning point, a day when we acknowledge where we have been, what we have done, and all that we hold in our hearts, mind, bodies and spirits that diminishes and devalues us. It is a time of letting go of all that keeps us tethered to ways that may be destructive, harmful or diminishing. We move into a time in the wilderness of Lent, where we can discover or rediscover God's invitation to be in a deep and meaningful relationship, and/or to deepen the relationship we are in with God. Lent is a time where we walk in the footsteps of Jesus the Christ, facing the storms, trials and challenges of our lives, and looking clearly at the difficult events and issues of the day.

Later in the first week of Lent, we gathered in worship to mark the first Sunday in Lent. Folks shared some ways they were marking the journey: 1) Committing to meditation and/or prayer each day; 2) committing to reading scripture each day; 3) engaging in multiple faith formation series and devotional studies and practices; 4) performing acts of kindness beyond what we do in our daily lives; 5) acknowledging and reflecting on what we are grateful for; 6) sitting in the morning and slowing ourselves down and emptying ourselves so that there is more space for God to come into our hearts and spirits.

Lent is sometimes about what we choose to give up or go without in this season. It can also be a time where we lean into who we are as disciples of Christ and seekers on a journey. Reading the Gospel this Sunday from the Gospel of Matthew, Chapter 4, verses 1-11, we encounter the well-known passage of Jesus' temptation and tests in the wilderness. There are many ways to engage in this passage and the interactions between the figure of Satan and Jesus. One emerging view is to see it asfacing our fears and insecurities, our self-rejection and self-denying of ourselves as beloved. It is often in those times, when our doubts, fears and guilt consume us, that we are most susceptible to the distractions that the "Devil" poses to Jesus: 1) the ability or urge to take the easy and expeditious way to comfort and prosperity, and to confuse what we need with what we desire; 2) The need to test God, and to develop a relationship with God that is transactional rather than convenantal, and grounds our faith in the things of this world. Lastly, 3) the seduction of power, status, and privilege and a grounding in the attractions of this material and temporal world, rather than the Love of, with and from God. Jesus resists these tests, relying on his faith, wisdom and love to know the true source of power and truth.

The late priest, theologian, author, teacher and servant Henri Nouwen spoke to the need to claim ourselves as beloved during this journey:

Over the years, I have come to realize that the greatest trap in our life is not success, popularity, or power, but self-rejection. Success, popularity, and power can indeed present a great temptation, but their seductive quality often comes from the way they are part of the much larger temptation to self-rejection. When we have come to believe in the voices that call us worthless and unlovable, then success, popularity, and power are easily perceived as attractive solutions. The real trap, however, is self-rejection. As soon as someone accuses me or criticizes me, as soon as I am rejected, left alone, or abandoned, I find myself thinking, "Well, that proves once again that I am a nobody."

. . . I deserve to be pushed aside, forgotten, rejected, and abandoned. Self-rejection is the greatest enemy of the spiritual life because it contradicts the sacred voice that calls us the "Beloved." Being the Beloved constitutes the core truth of our existence. In this journey of Lent, go forth and be loved, be in love, and be beloved!

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I'm Struggling

Every morning I begin my day with an app called Daily Quotes. Today's reads: "In order to receive the further good, we must give of that which we have." Margaret Becker. I have no idea who Ms. Becker is, but her words seem uplifting and non-grievous. I also check the app, Bible Gateway. Today's scripture is, 1 John 3:11 For this is the message to you heard from the beginning: We should love one another. An excellent verse to start the day. I receive each morning via email the UCC Daily Devotional. Various UCC ministers share their thoughts concerning scriptures or happenings of the day.

Then I go to my news feeds; NPR, Associated Press, Boston Globe, Washington Post, etc. I read about another mass shooting. Dissension in government. Us versus Them diatribes. Immigrants put on planes and flown to sanctuary cities. A cyclone in New Zealand and an earthquake in the Middle East. War in Ukraine. Violation of women's rights and restricting voting rights. LGBTQ people, Jewish people, Black and Brown people, Asian people, Muslims; all being discriminated against, and their lives threatened. I find my heart racing, and my moods fluctuating. I share positive quotes on our Wakefield Wonder and Grace Facebook page, but am I just hiding behind the words?

This morning, like many startings of my day, I took Dweezil for a walk on the snowmobile trails. The sun was bright as it reflected off the snow. The sky was azure blue. The temperature was in the 40s, too warm for February, but enjoyable just the same. I walk the trails and listen to the wind in the trees. In the distance a phoebe calls. I laugh at Dweezil's anticks as he rolls in the snow, or leaps through the deep drifts on the side of the trail. Being in the woods brings peace to my troubled mind. It calms my soul. I still think of all the things that perplexes me, but I try to counter with all that God has blessed me with. I have a loving husband. Our son is in a safe place. Our daughter thrives in Alaska. We have a wonderful home, and amazing friends.

Each Sunday the congregation lifts concerns; cancer, surgeries, financial difficulties, death. Maybe for each prayer and concern someone could share a positive. This would not be to demean or belittle those who have needs, but to allow us to see God's grace as we move through what sometimes appears to be a dark and perverse world.

Lord, you are my rock and my redeemer. Your love is immeasurable. Your grace abounds. Be with me as I struggle with the negatives of the day. Strengthen my heart and mind by showing me the blessings that this wonderful life provides. Lord, hear my plea.

Take-Aways from Prepared to Serve

Six of us, along with Rev. Larry Brickner-Wood, attended Prepared to Serve at Pembroke Academy. We each attended three workshops and are sharing our insights from the event.

Buddy Dee attended a <u>Jazz Worship</u> workshop and was very impressed with how contemporary variations of familiar hymns engages a congregation. He also attended <u>Liturgical Opportunities for the 21st Century</u> which gave a new look at how to use liturgy (or not use the same liturgical structure) for a newer —and for some a more interesting —worship experience

Joe Palmariello is getting used to all the acronyms of the UCC (United Church of Christ) during an O & A (Open and Affirming) workshop. Joe was particularly intrigued and interested in the strategies presented in a workshop on <u>Yoked Churches</u>, a situation where one pastor serves two churches. We shall be hearing more of this concept from Joe and from Buddy who also attended!

Nancy Dee attended two workshops on financial matters but what really interested her was a workshop on <u>Secular Books</u>. Nancy would love to be part of a secular book club sponsored by FCCW but asks, "Could someone else please organize it?" (This could be quite a hit. Move over Oprah and Reese!)

Norma Gore was very, very interested in a workshop led by Rev. Gayle Murphy, <u>Experience of Grace Outside the Church</u>, which encouraged taking your experiences of God, your faith, and your spirituality to others beyond the church walls.

Margie Galabrun attended this same workshop with Norma and writes: "We were challenged to consider creative ways we could bring God's love to people outside the church. The goal isn't necessarily to grow the church, but to grow God's community." Margie continues, "I couldn't help but think of our Shepherd Program where our drivers not only offer a valuable and necessary service to members of our community, but who very often need and enjoy it. How is our church doing? Are we people so filled with God's love that it just overflows?" Let God.

I was privileged to participate in a heart wrenching and somewhat miraculous story of Crying in the Wilderness: An Immigrant's Journey in Detention. One day I hope to be able to retell the story of the physical and emotional toll of seeking asylum in the United States with the degree of clarity and authenticity it deserves. Another equally meaningful experience was the workshop Let's Talk About Death and Dying in NH led by Rev. Mary James and Rebecca Brown, NH Alliance for End of Life Options. Participants explored more inclusive options to allow people to have a medical aid in dying when facing end of life, to avert extraordinary pain and suffering on the person who is terminal, allowing for a peaceful transition for individual and for the family and caretakers. The vision is "that everyone should live life fully and enjoy the highest quality of life possible, right to the end." The panel is interested in outreach to church and civic groups to enable a broad based consensus to eventually draft Medical Aid in Dying legislation similar to what has already

been passed in 10 states, including Maine and Vermont, and in the District of Columbia.

We hope to hear of Rev. Larry's Prepared to Serve insight as well!

News of Zimbabwe

As I write this Zimbabweans are bracing for Cyclone Freddy to hit as it moves from Mozambique towards Zimbabwe with 75 mph winds and "month's worth of rain" to fall in a day or two. Flooding rivers, landslides, and wind related damage will take a toll on vulnerable residents and their fields with budding crops of tomatoes, beans, potatoes and maize. Per meteorological reports, the most at risk areas are those villages and towns which PKZ projects cover and where our sister church, Rufumiso UCCZ, is located.

A 2023 shipping container is in the works! There is enough participation from UCC churches and other groups throughout NH, VT and MA to make this viable. We will be gearing up for an August loading and will be collecting, sorting and packing all types of items in the coming weeks and months. A "wish list" of desired and priority items will be made available (included in this newsletter). Your participation in this endeavor is so critical and so greatly appreciated.

In order to offset container costs, a pancake breakfast is being planned for Saturday, April 1st from 7:30-10:30. (Yes, really – no April Fools joke here!) You know the drill – yummy pancakes with eggs, sausages, juices and hot beverages. Mark your calendar!

Blessing Sithole, our second Zimbabwean student to be accepted at Keene State College, goes for his US Embassy interview on April 3rd. Blessing is excited that the process is moving along so well with all of his documentation in order. Samuel is on "pins and needles" as he awaits Blessing's arrival in July. These two, who communicate almost daily, haven't seen one another for almost two years.

Finally, I want to introduce Brian Maecha to you. Brian has been sponsored by a faithful, generous FCCW member for the past four or five years. Brian has just begun his A Levels (Form 5) at Gaza High School after achieving very good results in seven of his O Level exams. For a disadvantaged, vulnerable youth from an extremely rural, isolated area --for whom not having enough to eat or even owning a pair of shoes -- this is just remarkable.

And this is the power of sponsorship.

Spring is in the air as we are about to enter into the Easter Season. It is time to order lilies, tulips, and daffodils for our sanctuary!
