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The Pastor's Page

Beginning Again

The wonderful move "Begin Again, "released in 2013, has a wonderful song called "Lost Stars" sung by Adam Levine and Keira Knightly, that has a chorus that sings "Are we all lost stars, trying to light up the dark?" It is a wonderful testimony to the resiliency of the human spirit, even in the midst of great disorientation and despair. The song is also a song of belonging, and the power of our collective minds, heart, spirits and actions to face even the most uncertain future.

I have been thinking about this song as I journey through Lent. Five weeks have passed, and we are moving into the grand entrance of Palm Sunday, and the joy and celebration of Jesus, the Messiah, leading a procession of beloved children of God into Jerusalem. On the other side of the city, perhaps a different kind of entrance was occurring. On the west side of Jerusalem, King Herod was entering the city in a grand procession ahead of the Passover celebration. His procession would have been full of pomp and circumstance, and all the subjects, those under Roman rule, were expected to be there to make it seem like crowds of adoring people welcomed the ruthless ruler. Jesus' humble entrance, where no one was mandated to attend, or forced to pretend to be in awe, is in stark contrast. There, on the east side of the city, a procession of simplicity heralded a new day, a new beginning, a new way of belonging.

Of course, following Palm Sunday is Holy week, scenes of the last supper, Jesus' betrayal and arrest by the authorities, the judgement and sentence to death, and his execution by the Roman authorities. It is a terrible time of sadness and grief, of despair and fear, of another glimmer of hope extinguished by corruption, power, arrogance and fear. The darkness that descended following Jesus's death could have crushed the spirit of all who followed him.

We know, however, that it did not end there. A short three days later, with the morning dawn, it was discovered that Jesus has risen, that light overcame the darkness, that life triumphed over death, and that hope was born anew. Jesus' resurrection heralded a brand new day, and fulfilled Jesus' witness to a light that shines no matter how deep the shadows, and a love that will never be extinguished, and that shines brighter than fear, hate, violence, and oppression. Jesus the Christ is risen, and as we celebrate this blessed resurrection each year, we are invited to rise and shine into a new day, to know that we are never alone, that we are beloved children of God and that we are loved, always loved.

There is a beautiful Easter song written by Avery and Marsh called "" Every Morning is Easter Morning, from now on." Indeed, it is. Every day is an invitation to live fully into the Christ light that shines brightly in every heart, every community, and every place where Love reigns, and compassion, justice, mercy and kindness are the rule. Happy Easter to you all. Christ is risen. Christ is risen indeed!

Racial Justice Ministry

In October 2018, the New Hampshire Conference of the United Church of Christ adopted the Resolution of Christian Witness in Support of New Hampshire Conference United Church of Christ Congregations Awakening to Racial Justice. This landmark vote in the UCC made New Hampshire the first UCC conference to become a Racial Justice Conference. But, of course, passing this resolution is only the very beginning of the journey of our congregations becoming Racial Justice Churches. Now we embark on the holy work of living into our resolution to make the church more whole through racial justice.

The Racial Justice Mission Group (RJMG) believes that New Hampshire churches are fertile ground for this important work. As a predominantly white state, we are in a crucial position to wake up to the reality of white privilege in our churches and communities and to look more deeply into the racism embedded in the history of New England. We need to ask ourselves: what do we need to learn in order to understand racism in our society? Why are there not more people of color in the state and in our congregations? And then, what can we do about it?

As an Open and Affirming Church we should include the knowledge and practice associated with becoming a Racial Justice Church. I am calling all who would like to join the team that began this journey pre-pandemic. Following Coffee (Agape) Hour on April 2nd, we will have a brief meeting in the Fellowship Hall.

News of Zimbabwe

The good work of the PKZ Team continues! The Daisy Dube Children's Home at Mt. Selinda continues to receive monthly food deliveries from Mr. Vrante Jambaya which supplements their formerly meager diet with protein, veggies, and some kind of cool snacks for the kids to bring to school. The snacks may seem like a side note but it actually puts them on an even footing with their classmates who do not live in an orphanage. Baby Luke, who's mom died in childbirth in January, received some much needed infant formula with donations sent to Wakefield from a "fan of Sam's" who lives in Keene. Imagine feeding an infant watered down corn meal to fill their tummy because the nutrition dense infant formula is beyond reach. Also imagine the kids running like crazy and calling out excitedly Baba! (Father!) or Jambaya! when they see Vrante's vehicle enter their gates. For some eight years now PKZ has been providing not only essential nutrition, clothing, or other needed items but a sense of love, care, and compassion. These children have been residents since infancy and have never known a traditional family. They do know a circle of adults who are always there for them. The older kids - some grown now with babies of their own – send me Whats App messages that begin with "Hi Mom!"

The clinic project in Humani is shaping up with ceilings now in place. It seems as if hundreds of bags of cement have been delivered to make the brick walls and for the flooring. The renovations remind me of home projects that appear simple at the beginning but becomes more costly with additional supplies needed. The ceiling trim for the large rooms which will be divided into male and female wards and for the four smaller consultation rooms, two massive entry doors and an interior door, four very large windows, flooring and painting for the entire building will bring us to the finish line. Once this "punch list" is completed, the clinic will be need to be wired for electricity. This will be a huge deal for this community.

Thank you for the many inquiries concerning the humanitarian container. We will be taking items through Sunday, July 2nd. You may leave your items in a bag or a box at the church but please let me know if you do so that someone can pick them up quickly. If you live close by, someone can swing by and pick up! The sorting, boxing, invoicing and storage takes place away from the church.

Joy

Joy is my second favorite word. Balance is my first. But when I think about it, one cannot exist, without the other. If I am not joyful then I am in a state of imbalance and visa versa. According to openthebible.org in the English Standard Bible Version, the words "joy", "rejoice" or "joyful" appear in the Bible 430 times. Using my Young's Analytical Concordance, I find at least an entire page (3 columns in extremely small font) of the Greek, Hebrew, and Aramaic usages of these uplifting words, as compared to the less than one column of the words "happy", or "happiness". I think there is a message here.

Psalm 100:1 tells us to "Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth". Following the somewhat gloomy blanket of winter, that leaves me a little down, I find joy in the anticipation of Spring. Don't get me wrong, winter brings it's joy of snow covered adventures via snowshoes, skiing, ice fishing and the like. But by mid-March I am ready for the next season. The joy that comes from waiting with bated breath for the first flower to poke its tiny chromatic petals through the earth and snow, also provides the joy of Easter. Spring, in all its glory, reminds us of the risen Christ. Psalm 98: 4 tells us again to "Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth; break forth into joyous song and sing praises". Let us make a joyful noise about Christ's resurrection. Let us shine as lights and bring joy to all the earth. As Paul shared in his letter to Philippi in Philippians 4: 4 "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say Rejoice".

I Need Your Help!

In our First World athletic culture there is a sport called "endurance running," in which people pay for the pleasure of running very long distances (typically anything over a marathon's 26.2 miles) with regular aid stations attending to their water, food, and medical needs, and then receive a medal, buckle, or other prize, and get to pat themselves on the back and claim some bragging rights.

In Zimbabwe, "endurance" takes on a far more consequential meaning. The long distances our Zimbabwe friends walk just to supply their own water, attend school, or even receive critical medical care, are a far more worthy measure of the word. Can you imagine walking 75 miles to the hospital when you are sick, providing your own needs along the way?

On May 6th I am running an endurance race, a 24-hour loop course around White Lake in Tamworth. I will have aid stations with all the water, food, and first aid I require. I will be able to rest when I need to rest, and I can stop at any time. This is for FUN, and my life will not be harmed in any way if I simply walk away. This is not how it is in Zimbabwe, where people need to continue the race daily, just to survive. I am asking you to help me use my optional yet formidable challenge to make a difference. Your support can help sustain me through my miles, and together we can be one of their aid stations.

In the upcoming weeks I will ask you to sponsor me in my race. In addition to your financial sponsorship going directly to our church's humanitarian aid projects in Zimbabwe, I will dedicate my laps around the lake to your specific Zimbabwe concerns, using this time to reflect on the true meaning of endurance and how by supporting each other, we lighten each other's load. More to come! Thank you.
