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THE PASTOR'S PAGE

"Every Morning is Easter Morning" From Pastor Larry

"Every morning is easter from now on..." goes a line by the song of the same name by Richard Avery and Donald Marsh. We sang this as a Call to Worship on Sunday, and I have been singing the song since I first discovered it at the Greensboro, Vt. UCC church in 1984. The song sums up the essence of my own theology and that of much of our UCC tradition. We are an Easter people, and the glory, joy and impact of the Easter events and post resurrection narratives form the basis for our relationship with God and the world around us.

The post resurrection accounts found in the four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, and in Acts and first Corinthians, are beautiful witnesses to the faith revelation of Jesus' resurrection. There are no less than ten (10) of them. They are testimonies and formative texts that lay before us the future of what it means to live a Christian life, then and now.

There are some common elements of the Gospel accounts of the post resurrection appearances.

- Mary Magdalene was among the women who discovered the empty tomb, and alone in that discovery in the Gospel of iohn.
- Mary Magdalene was the person whom Jesus appeared to first in the Matthew, Mark and John accounts.
- Jesus appeared often in settings over a meal and in community and invariably taught while with his disciples.
- Jesus appeared at the lakeshore, on a mountain, in the garden, in a room and along the road.
- The disciples had a difficult recognizing Jesus at first, and/or believing it was actually him.

In the post resurrection accounts Jesus points us toward the future, not the past and what happened on the cross or even at the tomb. Jesus does not re-litigate his death or the events that led to it. Rather, he announces that 1) a new day has dawned; 2) death is overcome; 3) the power of violence, anger, fear, doubt, guilt, intimidation and oppression is overcome by the redemptive power of Love; 4) we are called to relationship with God, through Jesus and his teachings and ministry and through the enabling power of the Holy Spirit; 5) the nature of our relationship with God is comprehensive, and very much includes our relationship to and with each other, and with all of God's creation, including this magnificent earth; 6) we are called to be the Beloved Community, and 7) called to be witnesses to a light that the world needs, to and for the power of Love, compassion, forgiveness, redemption, mercy, justice and equity.

We are an Easter people, and the Eastertide season is a passage through what it means to us to be a Christian, and how we will live and practice that identity. The nurture and formation of our inner faith and relationship with God coincides with the call to integrative right relationship, with God, each other, and ourselves as we move through our time in this sacred garden, we call earth. They will know we are Christians by our love, and we will sing and live "Every morning is Easter morning from now on!"

Precious Time

I just returned from visiting my brother in Maryland. Lee will be 79 in May. Lee has Parkinson's. We think he has had faint symptoms for quite a while. It has only been the past year that neurological testing has confirmed the diagnosis. Lee is a Vietnam Veteran. They believe he contracted Parkinson's due to exposure to Agent Orange while serving his tour of duty. I was only 5 when he enlisted in the Navy. For the next four years, I remember watching the evening news with my parents. Walter Cronkite and other news anchors brought the first televised military conflict into our living rooms. Every time they showed bombs dropping or troops moving through the jungle I would ask if Lee was one of the soldiers.

A few years ago, he told me a story about how he was supposed to have flown on a mission, but due to a miscommunication another fellow took the flight. That plane was shot down. There were no survivors. I don't think Lee has ever gotten over the guilt associated with that result. One year, when traveling with students from Alaska to Washington DC, I was able to arrange to spend time with Lee. We met on the Mall, and walked to the various monuments and memorials. As we ventured along the Vietnam Wall, I lost sight of him. I found him up on a hill between the Wall and the Vietnam Women's Memorial. He was slightly out of breath, and as I approached him, I could tell he had been crying. He said he was so overwhelmed with grief and guilt that he had to



leave. I held him in my arms and told him, as sad as it was to see all of those names of fallen soldiers, I was glad his name was not one of them.

Lee is working hard at adjusting to his disease. He attends weekly boxing and Tai Chi classes. These help him with his loss of balance. He goes to the local VA where he shares in group sessions. Lee is a retired biology professor. Parkinson's has limited his ability to commune with nature, but he tries to go every morning to his favorite fishing holes. This last week we walked together across the earthen dam that led to the dock where he catches and releases blue gill or other sunfish. It brings 2 him joy. (Continued)

We rarely know when our time on earth will end. We also can't predict what condition we will be in when that time comes. All we can do is take one day at a time and carry the love of God in our hearts. Find your joy.

Lord, be with our family and friends and hold them in the palm of your hands as they journey through their days.

The Dry Grass of August (J-F) by Anna Jean Mayhew

In this beautifully written debut, Anna Jean Mayhew offers a riveting depiction of Southern life in the throes of segregation, what it will mean for a young girl on her way to adulthood—and for the woman who means the world to her.

On a scorching day in August 1954, thirteen-year-old Jubie Watts leaves Charlotte, North Carolina, with her family for a Florida vacation. Crammed into the Packard along with Jubie are her three siblings, her mother, and the family's black maid, Mary Luther. For as long as Jubie can remember, Mary has been there—cooking, cleaning, compensating for her father's rages and her mother's benign neglect, and loving Jubie unconditionally.

Bright and curious, Jubie takes note of the antiintegration signs they pass, and of the racial tension that builds as they journey further south. But she could never have predicted the shocking turn their trip will take. Now, in the wake of tragedy, Jubie must confront her parents' failings and limitations, decide where her own convictions lie, and make the tumultuous leap to independence . . . Source: Amazon



New Adult Faith Formation Class

Beginning in May, we will be jumping into our next study - a look at the parables by a Amy-Jill Levine: A self-described "Yankee Jewish feminist who teaches in a predominantly Protestant divinity school in the buckle of the Bible Belt," Levine "combines historical-critical rigor, literary-critical sensitivity, and a frequent dash of humor with a commitment to eliminating antisemitic, sexist, and homophobic theologies."



The book we will be using as the basis of our study is entitled **Short Stories by Jesus: The Enigmatic Parables of a Controversial Rabbi**

Jesus was a skilled storyteller and perceptive teacher who used parables from everyday life to effectively convey his message and meaning. Life in first-century Palestine was very different from our world today, and many traditional interpretations of Jesus' stories ignore

this disparity and have often allowed anti-Semitism and misogyny to color their perspectives.

In this Bible study based on her *Short Stories by Jesus*, Amy-Jill Levine analyzes these "problems with parables" taking readers back in time to understand how their original Jewish audience understood them. With this revitalized understanding, she interprets these moving stories for the contemporary reader, showing how the parables are not just about Jesus, but are also about us—and when read rightly, still challenge and provoke us two thousand years later.
