Sharing our Stories Pastor Larry Brickner-Wood

Jesus was a storyteller. In addition to being Messiah, Rabbi/teacher, prophet, witness, comforter and visionary, Jesus shared stories. Some of them were in the form of parables, simple stories designed to illustrate a moral or spiritual truth. Others were told in allegory or metaphor, while others were direct accounts of what Jesus had experienced. The Bible, our sacred text, is among other things, a collection of stories. The parable of the Good Samaritan in the Gospel of Luke is one wonderful example of a parable. The vivid writings of the Song of Songs are beautiful love poetry. The creation stories of the Book of Genesis are wonderful mythological accounts of God's creation. Paul's letters are wonderful testimonies, witness and narratives of an emerging community of believers. The mystical Book of Revelation is a dramatic blend of poetry, prose, myth, allegory, symbolism and prophecy. Our Bible is a book of sacred stories of depth, meaning, vision, faith and prophecy.

Stories can be powerful witnesses and inspiration for others. They can also be liberating and vehicles for release of the binding constraints of oppression and persecution. Throughout time, peoples oppressed, persecuted, enslaved and imprisoned by the powers have used stories, sometimes in the form of songs, poetry and art, to give voice to the voiceless and to keep the flames of hope burning in their communities and cultures. The long winding journey of our Jewish kindreds is one dramatic example of this phenomenon. Another are the accounts from our kindreds who are facing the hard hearted and brutal targeting and persecution of their identities and existence. We should listen to the stories of those who have been on the other side of power and the ways that has impacted their lives.

The insightful writer Kaitlin Curtice, who is from the Potawatomi Citizen Band of Oklahoma, says of the power of stories: "One of the most powerful ways change can happen is through storytelling, through a judgment free empathy for one another, for the places we've been and the hope we hold for ourselves, hope that beats in the hearts in our chests, hope that carries us from one day to the next, no matter who *our people* are." When we share our stories, we enter into sacred space with each other, and with the divine. Story sharing is sacred, and it is divine.

Kaitlin Curtice also writes in her essay "We Gather and We Shed," these powerful words: "It's why we need stories so much, to remember what we carry, to remember that we are always shedding and harvesting, shedding and harvesting, letting go and gathering in, sometimes with support, sometimes without it." We need each other's stories. We need our own stories to hold in our hearts, and to share with our beloveds who will come after we leave this earth. In the next few months, we will hear the stories of some of our beloveds and their own journeys of faith and spirit. We will have opportunities to share stories in small groups and around the table. We will share stories in one on one conversations, and in words, deeds and action. We are the people of the Story and the Dream, a dream that transforms and changes, moves mountains and makes all things new.

Our stories matter. Your story matters. In the sharing of our stories, we connect with our ancestors, inspire our peers, and light a path for the generations that will follow. Through the telling of our stories, justice reigns, peace prevails and the beautiful rainbow people of God birth heaven here on earth.

"I am happy I am still here. I am now in Grade 2. I am doing very well. I hope to pass all my subjects. My pet is a small dog whose name is Bravo. I like him very well." (Polite Mbonyeya)

"I would like to become a lawyer. I also like to play football (soccer) at school and even at home. Football is my best and I am able to play it too much. I would again like to extend a warm thank you to your families combined together to assist poor people. You play a very pivotal role in our life. May the Lord bless you forever and ever." (Brian Bote Maecha)

General Synod Wrap Up

General Synod 34 has officially concluded, marking the beginning of a time for action. During this Synod, 13 resolutions of witness, 1 bylaws change, and the election of a new GMP, Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson, took place. While some votes were more contentious than others, all of them hold relevance for our church in the coming years.

It is crucial to bear in mind that the resolutions passed by the greater body at General Synod are intended to speak to churches, not on their behalf. Under this structure, it is the responsibility of each individual church to adopt and act upon these resolutions. We earnestly urge you to invest time in studying these documents and facilitate discussions to determine their applicability to you and your church.
