Leaning into Lent with Love

Lent begins on February 14, 2024. It is a wonderful combination of the sacred day of Ash Wednesday and the day we know as Valentine's Day. In addition, Lent overlaps with the celebrations of Black History Month in February, and Women's History Month in March. March is also the celebration of National Reading Month, Disability Awareness Month, Social Work Month, Irish-American and Greek-American Heritage months, Bisexual Health Awareness month and a long list of other notable causes for the month, individual weeks and days, including one of my favorites, Adopt a Rescued Guinea Pig month!

The commemoration of Lent began shortly after the Council of Nicea in 325 CE. It was viewed primarily as a season of preparation for the celebration of Easter. It borrowed from earlier pagan practices, and the word Lent is an Anglo Saxon term meaning the lengthening of the days as Spring approaches. Some believe that the 40 day season of Lent is meant to remember the 40 days of temptation that Jesus endured in the desert.

Some have scoffed at the notion of Lent and Valentine's Day falling on the same day, reading that the "Hallmark" influenced secular holiday of Valetine's Day has nothing in common with Lent. I understand that perspective, but I do not see Valentine's Day as simply a secular holiday. Though the historical facts and evidence are scattered and inconsistent, there are some nice pieces we can use during our Lenten journey. The name Valetine was a popular name in the Roman empire, and there are numerous St. Valentine's in the Roman Catholic tradition. Three appealing images of Valentine are as a Roman Catholic Priest or Bishop in the third century who was often persecuted for his beliefs and actions. While under house arrest ordered by Judge Asterius, Valentine was asked to meet with the blind daughter of the judge. Engaging in conversation with her, Valentine laid his hand upon her eyes and she was healed. Valentine was released and continued to preach the Good News. Later, when he had bene sentenced to death by the Roman authorities, he wrote a letter to the daughter starting "to my valentine."

After his release from house arrest, Valentine continued to advocate for the poor and to preach the Gospel. He also performed "secret marriages" as an act of protest to the militarism of Rome. Married young men could not be conscripted into the Roman Army, and Valetine's actions directly contradicted the rule of Rome. He was eventually martyred and executed by the empire.

Rather than see Valentine's Day as simply a day to celebrate romantic love, it can be a day of celebrating love in all its forms, especially the all-embracing and sacred Agape love that Jesus and the disciples speak about so frequently. For the Church, it is a time to lift up the Love that is at the center of our faith, and to celebrate that God's love is for everyone. As we move through our journey in Lent, may we do it centered in the awesome reality of God's love manifest so beautifully in Jesus Christ and brought to our hearts by the Holy Spirit.

This Ash Wednesday we will begin the journey through Lent, and also commemorate the Love that is at our center as a people and a community of faith. Throughout Lent, we will focus on leaning into and leading with Love as the collective people of God. We will be exploring and experiencing God's love as the divine and sacred gift that it is, and also the ways it is manifest in the actions of the beloved cloud of witnesses who shine God's love into the world every day. When I was young, we marked Lent by "giving up" something during the season, and fasting in the morning on Fridays. As life has unfolded and my sense and understandings have changed, I now see it as a time to lean into something. Rather than giving up an item or act, it is a time to do something that renews and enhances my faith journey, that deepens my spiritual growth, and that helps others experience the Love that God provides in my life every day. Prayer, reading of Scripture and sacred texts, engaging in individual or group studies, using a daily or weekly devotional, attending services and events are all wonderful ways to grow in our faith. Just as restorative are the intentional acts of kindness, the acts of service, the care and support of those in need, and engaging in ways that promote justice, enhance equity, broaden inclusion and shine Love into our world.

Welcome into this Lenten season. Welcome into another journey through Spirit and sacred practice. Welcome into a journey with Jesus, blending enlightenment and challenge into a symphony of Love. Welcome into this journey where your heart, mind, spirit, soul and body can be renewed. I look forward to moving along on this journey with you.


Zoom for any classes where weather might pose a problem)

Notes from the Treasurer

We are a generous church! To back up that statement, this is what YOU donated over the last 12 months of 2023: Strengthen the Church \$145.00; Neighbors in Need \$466.00; The Christmas Fund \$777.11; and One Great Hour of Sharing \$1,020.00. These four collections, totaling \$2408.11, go to the NH Conference of UCC.

Additionally, you donated \$575.00 to Heifer International. AND, on top of all that, YOU donated a staggering \$21,328.06 to our Zimbabwe friends and another \$4720 to the Feddern Diaconate Discretionary Fund of which \$4755 has been donated to people in need.

Let's not forget the in-kind donations of baked goods, soup, yard sale items, and the incredible man-hours it takes to pull off the many fundraisers we have throughout the year. We are so very fortunate to have so many people volunteer their time for building upkeep, maintenance, and attending meetings necessary to keep the church running smoothly.

Financially, we dipped into the Parsonage Fund for the first time in about 5 years, transferring \$10,000 to the General Fund for expenses. This was expected, as our approved budget has a deficit of \$54,514.

27 After this he went out and saw a tax collector named Levi sitting at the tax-collection station, and he said to him, "Follow me." 28 And he got up, left everything, and followed him. (Luke 5: 27-28 NRSVUE)

There once was a television show named Joan of Arcadia that I looked forward to watching every week. The premise of the show was that a teenage girl made a deal with God that if her brother did not die after his horrific automobile accident, she would do whatever God asked of her. In each episode of the series, God's request was delivered to Joan by ordinary people whom she met during her daily routines. The requests seemed small, sometimes mundane, but the outcome of her fulfilling her obligation without hesitation sometimes had monumental effects with everlasting impact on many lives. I loved these fictional stories. Joan was only a teenager and she had an enviable trust in God and the messages randomly delivered to her. I wonder, could I ever be like her?

I believe there is documented evidence that many of the events that occurred in the narratives of the Bible happened, especially about Jesus' life and Ministry. But perspective, translation, and ancient world environs may have skewed the historical details. But the importance of these events remains the same, especially the way they influence how I should strive to live in this world.

But I wonder, do I? Could I TRUST as Joan of Arcadia did? She trusted that God would answer her prayer. She trusted all the friendly, strange, different people who brought her God's requests. Could I? Would I respond to the words "follow me" as Levi did? Maybe to be kind, respectful, and helpful to others; to show mercy and grace to those who need it; to love God unconditionally, and to love my neighbor are what it means to follow Jesus, to truly 'follow in his footsteps'. Maybe I can....

Because I do trust that God has been walking beside me, prodding me, saving me, teaching me, and protecting me all of my life, when I hear or read the words that Jesus said to his disciples, 'Come, follow me', maybe I can too. Or at the very least, I can try.

The pastor's current "accommodation" is two utility rooms at the back of the church. Rev. Mtisi's wife and children have yet to join him because of the housing situation.

"Thanks for your love and generosity. This gesture came to us at a time when we were wondering how we would raise funds for window panes so that at least the plastered rooms can be inhabitable. We will forever be grateful and pray that God blesses you, your friends, and the Wakefield Church. I started well and am coping with the hot temperatures at Rufumiso UCCZ. Thank you for the welcome and prayerful wishes. Kindly pass my fraternal greetings to Rev. Larry Brickner Wood and to the Wakefield Church. Stay blessed." I hope to be able to share a photo soon of Rev. Mtisi and his family.

Last month I told you about the wonderful donation by the Men's Fellowship which provided new uniforms and school supplies for the children at Daisy Dube and I promised you photos. More good news! PKZ finished building a home for a family in which the father is deaf and mute. Shepherd, his wife, and six children had a deteriorating one room accommodation without any proper windows or a floor. The size of the home increased three fold and now has a cement floor, multiple exterior doors, large windows, and it is painted! Shepherd now works as a laborer for Maxwell Makuyana, the builder Vrante hired for the job. That's empowerment! Celia Randall donated her husband's masonry tools via the shipping container and they are being used by Maxwell and his crew. Maxwell is also a member of Rufumiso UCCZ. Isn't this ripple effect amazing? Since I am clearly over my photo allowance, look for photos to be included on the church website.

Lessons From Nature

I'm sitting at my computer watching the birds outside my large bay window. There are chick-a-dees, gold finches, nut hatches, woodpeckers, and juncos. They move between the feeders and the droppings on the snow -covered ground. Occasionally they chase each other away from the seed that they feel is strictly theirs. But for the most part they accept each other as neighbors vying for the same life sustaining nourishment. A couple of grey squirls have joined the fray as have a few "bully" blue jays. I overheard people asking, "where are the birds"? Between snowfall and melting these past few weeks, the birds were able to find food in the woods and not the feeders.

We could learn a lot from watching nature. The flora and fauna that God has created are interwoven in their existence. Of course, there is the "food chain" that results in life-threatening competition, but for the most part within a species they seem to get along. So why can't humans? As I mentioned in church the other Sunday, ignorance breeds fear, which breeds hate, which breeds violence and war. Differences are normal, and in some cases are healthy. All decisions or choices are based on the simple formula of "push / pull". Something is pushing us away from a belief, environment, or political platform, while pulling us toward another. We must live with our choices and their rewards or consequences. I only ask that we make our choices with an informed, loving heart that results in the betterment for all and not a select few. We as a species need to pause and listen to the concerns of others. 2nd Timothy 1:7 says, "For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and love and of a sound mind." It is Jesus's message that we love one another, as stated in Matthew 22: 27-39. The first and great commandment is to love God, and second to love our neighbor as ourselves. In today's divisional society that second part can be difficult to accomplish. But remember 1 Corinthians 13 says, "Love is patient, love is kind, it does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, and it keeps no record of wrongs."

Looking again out the bay window, the precipitation moves from rain, to sleet, to snow, and back to rain. The birds are still feeding, but not in such numbers as earlier. The squirls have chased each other away, and the jays have traveled to a different property and feeders. The snow and ice fall from the rooftop with an almost rhythmic thump upon the deck. Life cycles continue and interact. We awake each day with the challenge to love God and neighbor. As we engage with our fellow humans, let's take a pause to listen without fear.
