Easter People!

Here we are in April! The time when all will become right with the world. Peace will reign, the earth will be healed, equity and justice will be the rule, and all illness and suffering will be relieved. Okay, April Fools! That won't happen, at least right away. But it is the Easter season, and we are an Easter people! The people of the Way, disciples of Christ, believers in the dream that God birthed unto earth. We are the seed planters, the harvesters ad cultivator of the gardens of God's glory, where all are welcome and all find a home in the heart filled with love and compassion.

It is Eastertide, which runs in 2024 from Easter on March 31st to Pentecost on May 19th. It is a fifty day season between the two holy days, where we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Beyond the symbolic notion of the celebration of the resurrection, it is also a time where we celebrate the practical resurrection, that is, a time of rebirth. In this Eastertide, we are called to be born again into a new day and a new way. We are invited to let go of all the baggage, fears and doubts that surface in our lives, and release into a freedom of a life in Christ.

"Sure," you might say, "that sounds nice," but what does it really mean and how do we in fact, live into it." That's a great question, and one simple answer is, one seed and prayer at a time." Here a few ideas you may want to ponder:

- April 21 is Earth Day, and this is a great season to reflect on the intersection of your Chrisitan faith with a passion and commitment to Earth healing. We'll explore that at our April 21 Earth Day service with the wonderful writer Chelsea Steinhauer-Scudder.
- Throughout the season, we explore the ways that Jesus came to his beloveds in the forty days after the resurrection, foreshadowing the ways Jesus continues to show up in our lives today.
- The Faith Fomation group will be focusing on a wonderful program called "Anatomy of a Chrisitan," an expansive look at the intersection of Chrisitan faith, racial justice, equity and exploring our place in making the visions of Easter ongoing realities for a world in desperate need of healing.
- It is a time of celebration, including affirming the beautiful blessing of community. Whether it be by worshipping together, celebrating over meals, sharing our creative gifts, drumming, serving the wider community, welcoming new and old alike and/or cultivating the seeds we plant throughout the year, there is a place for all of us in the wonderful journey of Eastertide.

After all, as the song goes: "Every morning is Easter morning from now on." Just as Mary Magdalene and the other beloved disciples were forever changed by the resurrection, may the joy of this Easter season grow in our hearts, every day, every moment, and every blessed encounter. We are an Easter people, and the world will never again be the same.

News of Zimbabwe

Last week the Zim inflation rate hit an all time high with one US dollar going for \$20,000 Zim dollars. Less than two years ago it was \$1 to Zim \$280. The economy, along with a nationwide drought, is creating continued famine and food insecurity. We are asked to continue to pray for our sister church at Rufumiso and for all of our friends in Zimbabwe.

I have much better news closer to home with updates on our Zim Keene students, Samuel Khumbula and Blessing Sithole. Sam has been accepted into a 10 week summer research program at the Perlman School of Medicine at University of Pennsylvania! He will be one of 20 students doing research on radiation oncology with some very high level, widely known professionals (at least highly known by other researchers). We did a quick three day visit to Philly over spring break to familiarize Sam with the area. Not only did he spontaneously meet with the program coordinator, he met with three of the researchers, got a tour of the labs and sat in on a professional presentation. Sam is in heaven and is already planning to take part in a research project that can be published by the completion of his summer program. Sam LOVED all things U Penn and had an opportunity to tour the city.

Sam would have loved to have had an opportunity to do a summer internship focused on aerospace engineering but learned he couldn't get a sePcurity clearance because he isn't a US citizen. Sam felt the U Penn program was closer to physics than another offered to him by Dartmouth. Also, 93% of the students in the UPenn summer program go on to elite schools for their PhDs. That's Sam's goal.



Blessing was part of a Keene student leadership trip over spring break that took him on the path of Martin Luther King, Jr. The students stopped in DC and viewed the site of MLK's 'I Have a Dream' speech, visited the Holocaust Museum and the African American Museum, went to Greensboro, on to Selma, on to Atlanta, and then to Memphis. He made it back to Keene

on the Sunday after the big snowstorm. It was a lot for Blessing to process emotionally but he enjoyed every part of the trip. Blessing drove one of the two student vans and is now quite the experienced USA driver.

Blessing has a summer internship lined up in the Keene area. They make us proud, don't they? Your continuing interest and support of these fine, hardworking young men is deeply appreciated.

Hazel MacBrien Nursery News

During March we keep track of the weather days. We decide if the weather is a lion day or a lamb day. March started off with several lamb days but then the lion days came, and we had some very windy and even some snowy days too. We're hoping that we have more lamb days to end the month. Both classes made bunnies for our Hopping Into Spring bulletin board!

We worked on letter Kk during the first week of March. The threes did some activities with kites and kangaroos and our sensory table was filled with corn, gold coins, green shamrocks and pots. The fours class made kangaroos and used beads to make simple patterns on kites with pipe cleaners for string.

During the 2nd week we introduced the letter Gg. The kids enjoyed mixing yellow and blue paint to make a green shamrock. The threes class made a green collage and explored with shaving cream and gold coins. The fours class made rainbow number towers with unifix cubes, and we also worked on syllables. Both classes brought in a green snack to share with their class and wore green clothing to celebrate St. Patrick's Day. The leprechaun visited our school and left the children a shamrock lollipop and a squishy green clover.

The next week we worked on number three. Our sensory table was filled with beans, eggs, bunnies, carrots and chicks. The threes class used mini erasers to trace paths from bunny to egg and we worked on shapes by matching the bunny shape to the carrot shape. We also rolled a die and played feed the bunny that many mini carrot erasers. The afternoon class worked on rhyming by putting two halves of an egg together and making unifix cube math equations.

For the last week of March, we introduced the letter Ee. The threes opened a plastic egg, and we did some movements like buzz like a bee, flap your wings like a butterfly and hop like a bunny. They also worked on scissor skills by cutting up pieces of construction paper and then glueing them onto an egg shape. The fours class used scissors to cut eggs in half along different lines, sorted eggs from smallest to biggest and worked on 10-frames. Thursday, March 28th was our 100th day of pre-k!! We celebrated with a frosted donut and doing 10 different exercises 10 times to equal 100 total exercises using our projector

We hope everyone enjoyed their Easter even with the snow on the ground!

Denominations

I was raised Southern Baptist. I suppose for those who have some idea as to what that entails, I could end my essay right here. For you unlearned, here is the foundation. The preacher spoke of hell and damnation, fire and brimstone. Repent was a word I heard early in my childhood. Many times, I left church fearful about what I might have done, or what I might do that would cause me to go to hell. That's a lot of weight for a child to carry. There were alter calls that could be conducted multiple times in one's life, kind of like going to confession for the Catholics, but it was a public display. Another public display was the actual baptism. This involved full body water dunking before the whole congregation. I was baptized when I was ten. I did it for my Mama. I was baptized again when I was 15. I did it for myself. I did not know that according to the Baptist doctrine that I was not supposed to dance. Well, that did not set right with me for I love to dance. I'm sure there were other specifics that I was unaware of, but by that time in my life I was moving on.

Later in my teens and early adulthood I began searching for a church or theology that I could relate to. I attended Presbyterian, Methodist, other mainstream Christian denominations. My freshmen year of college found me looking into the Baha'i faith. It was simple and we met in homes or common settings. Mostly I liked the folk style of the music. Most of my twenties were spent unchurched. By my early thirties I found The Way Ministry. It too met in homes. The attraction for me was the research of the Bible. The leaders said, "Don't take my word for any biblical interpretation, learn it for yourself". Yet that is exactly what they ended up doing. They told me that if any family members, including my children, claimed to be gay, then I was to basically disown them. Whoa, stop right there! I still use the research method of learning the Greek, Aramaic, and Hebrew translations of the Bible. They could not take that away from me.

Today, George and I are members of the best church ever. The First Congregational Church of Wakefield, UCC is our family. The Open and Affirming component of this church relates to our point of view. The Social Justice doctrine has been a part of my personal beliefs for most of my life. The FCCW church family is one of the most welcoming that I have encountered. We are active in the community without being judgmental towards those who may not follow our beliefs. Even within the members themselves there is no hostility towards different political or social concepts. For the most part, we walk-the-talk of Christ by loving God, our neighbors and ourselves. What more is needed?

Lord, I thank you for giving me a church that I can call home.
