LET THE RESURRECTION BE

Clergy people are often asked if they believe personally in the bodily Resurrection of Jesus. Most clergy have times of wrestling mightily with such concepts, and times of doubt and struggle, just as lay folk do. And this is a tough one. How could this have happened—this Resurrection?

One great thing about answering such questions is that there comes a time when one realizes that whatever happened, happened—and whatever any of us might think about it does not and cannot change the facts on the ground. God is who God is (see Exodus 3: 14a) and an individual's personal thoughts and opinions will not change God's transcendent, loving, steadfast nature. It is clear that when we do not and cannot allow ourselves to believe, we deny ourselves some wonderfully transcendent, loving, and steadfast positive consequences of belief. And it is utterly certain that something extraordinary happened after Jesus' crucifixion. The texts are very compelling, to say the least. Who would risk the absurdity of telling such a tale?

What would happen if we all dared to let our belief fly, uncaged, wild and free? What would it mean for our lives to believe that things we find to be impossible are indeed possible with / for God? What do we risk to let ourselves truly rest in the promises of God, and to taste the joy and grace that can come from such an exuberant "yes?"

May every fresh green blade of grass, every colorful crocus blossom breaking through the cold hard earth, every scent of warmer spring-scented air riding on a colder current, lead us to dare to believe that the God who seeks to liberate us from our greatest limitations and liabilities as human beings really did accomplish the Resurrection, to show us for all time that sin, death, and destruction never have the last word. Let us try out the Resurrection belief that we are called to rise above our tendencies toward the despair of believing that we can never live in peace, that poverty and misery must always be part of our world, and that we cannot protect our planet. Resurrection belief embraces the notion that those things we regard as the darkest certainties are not certainties at all—because with trust in God's vision and call to us to build a just and peaceful world, and with God's equipping grace, we can break through dark certainties into life-giving new scenarios.

Do we believe in the Resurrection of Jesus? Let us! Do we struggle with this doctrine? Of course—a mature faith always struggles. Can we give into believing it anyhow, without understanding it fully? Oh, yes, let's! Let us set a wild faith free, and see what God can do with us!

SUCCESSFUL PRESENTATION AT PTS

Rev. Mary James, Margie Galabrun and Jan Fairchild presented "Progress Report: Second Year of Unleashing Spiritual Gifts with New Structure" at this year's Prepared to Serve conference. We provided a review of the factors that prompted our church to explore a new way of "doing church organization"; a comparison of our two Ministry Fairs; and the fruits and challenges of the new structure. The 18 enthusiastic attendees participated in an excellent conversation about Mission, Vision and the Identification of Spiritual Gifts as the foundation and ongoing standard for church organization.

The report highlighted the critical importance of communication. We must be constantly vigilant to ongoing education and information about how our new structure works. We have many excellent communication tools, including our church website and Facebook groups as well as Steeple Views, Sunday bulletins and email. Personal conversations are invaluable for clarifying information and inviting people to participate in the Ministries of the Church. Several attendees expressed appreciation for the presentation, asked if we could establish an email group for more frequent sharing of information, and encouraged us to return next year for another report.

SHOPPER SHUTTLE TO ROCHESTER

Since April 2011 COAST has operated the North Bus, a volunteer-driven minibus that brings residents of Wakefield, Middleton, Milton, Farmington, New Durham, and Brookfield to Rochester for shopping and social services. The North Bus is open to the public, with priority given to the elderly and disabled. Riders are picked up at their homes and brought to a predetermined set of destinations. Generally, the North Bus passengers visit Walmart, Market Basket, and occasionally the Lilac Mall or the Rochester Community Center.

To register as a North Bus rider, just call 1-855-736-4287, Monday – Friday, 9am – 3pm. The North Bus is wheelchair accessible and will pick you at your home. The fare

COAST is also recruiting additional volunteers to help keep the North Bus running. The bus is driven by volunteers who drive 1 -3 shifts each month. No CDL is required, but COAST will provide some training on driving the 12-passenger minibus. The service is offered Tuesday – Friday and drivers start at the Milton DOT yard at around 8:00 a.m. and finish in the early afternoon.

Operating Budget (Non-restricted): July 1, 2012 – January 31, 2013

Income: \$ 84,968.05 Expenditures: \$ 79,040.67 Net Income (Loss) \$ 5,927.38

Restricted Funds balance as of January 31, 2013: \$1,878.89

SABBATICAL, WHAT IS IT?

Sabbatical (from Latin *sabbaticus*, from Greek *sabbatikos*, from Hebrew *shabbat*, i.e., Sabbath, literally a "ceasing") is a rest from work, or a hiatus, often lasting from two months to a year. Sabbatical is connected with the last day of Creation when God rested. (Genesis 2:3) God both models and commands Sabbath rest for his people. "Remember the Sabbath to keep it holy." (Exodus 20:8-11)

Jesus affirmed the importance of rest saying, "The Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath. So the Son of Man is Lord even of the Sabbath." (Mark 2:27-28) The Biblical example of Jesus' own frequent withdrawal to a quiet place to meditate, pray and be renewed is a model. In His ministry, the constant demands of people led Jesus to step away on a regular basis (wheatridge.org).

A Sabbatical is NOT a vacation. Normally during a Sabbatical a person engages in research, rest, study and / or travel. Our own Reverend Mary will be taking a Sabbatical this coming August through October. During her time of absence we will take pleasure in having Reverend Albert Mhururu (pronounced ma-ru-ru with "long" u's) from Zimbabwe as our Minister. Reverend Mhururu is excited about teaching, preaching, and learning during his stay. He and Reverend Mary will be conducting the church service together on the first Sunday before Mary's Sabbatical and also on the last Sunday following her return. This will be a wonderful representation of the Passing of the Pulpit so to speak.

The Diaconate is very much aware of how this kind of change within our church causes some people to get a little anxious. No worries. We are a strong, spiritual congregation that consists of individuals with many talents. And with Reverend Mhururu assisting us we will be just fine. But before we get too wrapped up in our own fears concerning the time away from our beloved Reverend Mary, let's look at it through the eyes of love. Mary will have a wonderful opportunity to rejuvenate herself physically, mentally and spiritually. If you think she is dynamic now (and I do) then wait until she returns following her Sabbatical. It is like being recharged. Mary has planned a detailed schedule of her Sabbatical that she will present to the congregation by the end of April. More information concerning Mary's time away and Reverend Mhururu's time with us will follow in future venues. Until then let's keep all of this in our prayers and relish the joy in providing what is recommended by the UCC guidelines, as well as our contractual obligations, this time of "ceasing" or Sabbatical in which Mary richly deserves.

We get it. It's so easy to just fill the travel mug and hit the road. But in a recent conversation with Equal Exchange, I learned that there are two major reasons why they are not offering K-Cups. First, they continue to maintain that it is more environmentally friendly to use less packaging. Second, there is a rather costly patent royalty which would have to be paid, which would lessen the profit margin available for the small farmers.

So, go ahead and use your K-Cups when it's convenient, but remember to stock a bag of our wonderful organic, fair trade coffee for those times when you're going to brew a pot.

LENTEN PROGRAM FOR PARISH HELPERS


