# **RISE TO THE OCCASION**

Blessed Eastertide to all!

Each year, in this glorious season of Easter as we celebrate the Resurrection of Christ, we are offered anew the conviction that with God, we can accomplish what seems impossible. As new life springs forth from the earth all around us, we are invited by the Easter event to trust that new life can also spring forth from our hearts. God has made our hearts fertile ground; new loves can be planted and grow!

As a congregation, we are now preparing for a wonderful opportunity to be the Body of Christ in a very special way. Our Conference Minister, Gary Schulte, recently returned from a trip to Zimbabwe and considers Rev. Mhururu a friend. Rev. Schulte was delighted when he heard that Rev. Mhururu will be here while I am on sabbatical. Our Deacons and your Pastor are aware that for some, having a minister from another culture has brought about some worries. We prayerfully encourage all to embrace the unique cross-cultural experience that this plan presents to us. Cross-cultural encounter and understanding are crucial elements as we seek to build a more peaceful world. And imagine how he must feel! He will be away from his home and his family for an extended period. We encourage you to open your hearts to him as you would to any new minister in your midst, and to be part of assuring that he has a good experience.

Rev. Mhururu is a kind, experienced and learned ordained minister, as well as a father and a grandfather, and we are a warm and loving congregation. What a great combination! He and we will rise to the occasion (Easter pun intended) and our love of God and one another will deepen as a result.

The Deacons and I will keep you posted as we progress in making our plans. Happy Eastertide! Blessings and peace, Mary

March as always means more oil bills, mandatory maintenance inspections and insurance bills. However, I think March will end just fine this year, after all, it ends with Easter!

Financial matters (including the annual budget, stewardship, church investments and fund raising) were front and center at the March 17 Leadership Council meeting. I was very happy to see that a few interested church members besides the officers and ministry coordinators attended this time. There is a group of indigenous people called the Achuar who have lived for centuries deep in the rain forest of what is now known as Ecuador and Peru. But when oil development began to cause an imbalance in their part of the world, their dreams became troubled.

The Achuar reached out to other indigenous tribes of the area, and eventually caught the attention of the people of the north. ### FOR THE HOSPITALS:

- Hearing aids with batteries
- Pain relievers ibuprofen, aspirin
- gauze bandages
- antibiotic ointment
- anti diarrhea medication
- cough/cold medication, Vaporub
- vitamins (children and adult)
- infant formula (powdered)
- toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap
- sanitary pads
- petroleum jelly

# FOR THE SCHOOLS:

- student notebooks
- library books
- textbooks (math, science, reading)
- office supplies
- pencils, pens, erasers, sharpeners
- rulers, chalk
- art supplies
- musical instruments
- tote bags for teachers
- Playground toys: i.e., soccer balls, basketballs, jump ropes, volleyballs
- Athletic uniforms and equipment (There is a high demand for soccer jerseys, bibs, athletic footwear, socks, sports towels, uniform bags, and equipment for soccer, baseball, track, basketball, and volleyball.
