## THE PASTOR'S PLACE . . .

## **ADVENTURE ACROSS THE DIVIDE**

Advent, that much-neglected and under-observed season of preparation of our hearts for the reality of the Christ child, has begun. Each Sunday, as we light the candle in the Advent wreath for the coming week, we lift up a great element of our faith, in this order: Hope. Peace. Joy. Love.

And yet.

Here we are, in a divided country. The partisan lines have been drawn, and we are reeling from the after-effects of a political season that reached new lows of harshness. We have rigidly taken sides. We have demonized those with whom we disagree, making it hard to name and see the real demons, and harder still to own up to them when they reside inside of us. Awash in exposure to shallow and osound biteo news sources, we listen to and read only those with whom we agree. Social media is flooded with fake news; lies, repeated often enough, are heard as truth. The biggest victim may be democracy itself.

Enough.

Who are we in the midst of this, as the Church, the Body of Christ? What is the role of the Church in this particular time of division, and reports of hate crimes---a time in which even family members and friends who voted differently find their relationships torn apart?

We, the Church, are called by our God to bring a healing word of love. We are called to remind everyone that before they were named õDemocratö or õRepublicanö they were named Beloved Child of God. We are called to set a wide table and invite everyone to disarm their hearts and pull up a chair. We are called to make sure that everyone has a safe place at the table and has what they need, and to look around and make sure we have given the places of honor to those who are most vulnerable.

If we find ourselves õhating onö those with whom we strongly disagree right now, we are giving our opponents way too much power over our minds, hearts, and souls. Are you part of the Body of Christ? If so, the way forward is clear: *Do to others as you would have them do to you.* Do this, all the time, every day, no matter what. This will be very difficult, but it will change the world, a person at a time. We are all going to need help with this. Let& think of it as our ADVENTure, as heart-preparation for the acceptance of the ultimate act of vulnerable love: God coming to us as an infant, born low in status to a poor refugee family, and in great danger, to pour out love.

May you have a disarming ADVENT and a deeply blessed Christmas. May we all see to it that this can be so for every person.

This year, Additional Income Sources of over \$63,000 were included in the Income portion of our budget in order to cover the projected expenses. So far we have tapped into these sources for \$12,500, as you can see above. Of this amount, \$7,500 came from unexpended prior year funds and \$5000 from the Alden Young Unrestricted Gift from Dec 2015.

The Harvest Fair held on November 12<sup>th</sup> was once again a very successful fundraiser. As of last Sunday, November 13, around \$2900 had come in. Thanks go to everyone who took part including Chair Ginny Schweitzer, setter-uppers, cooks, bakers, dishwashers, table watchers, gift basket makers, and the disassembly crew. Who have I forgotten? Besides the boost to the budget fundraising line, the Fair was also priceless when it came to cheerful camaraderie.

Advent begins on the last Sunday in November, which of course means Alternative Gifting! What will you give the person who has everything this year?

## ZIMBABWE PARTNERSHIP NEWS OUTREACH RUFUMISO STYLE




Our travel team has been in touch with Samuel Basera, a middle aged gentleman who is a deacon at Rufumiso. Samuel, who walks between 2-3 hours from his home to reach the Rufumiso Church is excited about a new evangelism and lay leadership that he is doing. Think Vitality Team, Zim style. Samuel attended a week long training in October with another training to take place in 2017. His train-

ing project? To bring õback slidersö back to church and bring their lives to Jesus Christ. He writes that between now and December 2017 he will take part in a membership drive. He says, õI will follow our back sliders by visiting their places. I will hold revivals in all of the six preaching points once a month. I will introduce Bible study before worship. I will preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and bring souls to the Kingdom of God by sharing the good news to the nation.ö

Amazingly, he is Rufumiso's one man vitality team and he has no funding! Rufumiso has been without a settled pastor for more than a year so lay people take on huge responsibilities to keep their church alive.
